## Work Smarter - Not Harder

If rain dampens your hopes for a backyard barbecue, you may decide to move indoors. But be careful -- charcoal broiling can be fatal in an enclosed area. If you move your grill to a garage be sure there is plenty of ventilation. Better yet, do the cooking on a covered porch or patio where the fire has plenty of air and there is less danger of harmful fumes. Can sleeping bags be washed? Our County Extension offices get many calls about cleaning sleeping bags but the answer depends on the bag. Some bags are washable, some are dry cleanable and some cannot be cleaned either way. Hopefully, you kept the tags and information which came with your bag. If not, go back to the store where you got it, if possible, and check on a similar bag. Or take it to a dry cleaner and see if it will be accepted for cleaning.

Major electric appliances such as freezers, refrigerators and washers are now required to have internal grounding. The plug will have three prongs. If your wall outlets will not take a three-pronged plug, you can buy an adaptor for a nominal price. However, unless the outlets of your wiring system are grounded, you will still not have protection from shocks. If you don't know about the wiring in your home, an inexpensive circuit tester is available at many hardware stores. Directions for use come with it.
