Research gifts and grants to OSU totaled \$734,140 from private sources; \$242,370 from state and local agencies; and \$7,802,113 from federal sources.

OSU Gifts, Grants Total 14 Million Past Year

Gifts and grants to Oregon State University for student aid, research, buildings and equipment, library purposes, and improvement of instruction totaled \$14,179,000 from July 1, 1969 to June 30, 1970.

The gifts and grants are indispensable, of course, to the operation of the university, President Robert W. MacVicar emphasized.

The funds are in addition to the regular appropriations received from the state legislature and from Congress.

Private sources -- businesses, foundations, alumni, clubs and organizations, and interested individuals -- provided nearly a quarter-million dollars for student aid (scholarships, emergency funds, and loans), the report revealed.

Federal funds for work-study programs and for various types of student loans totaled another \$371,060. In all, nearly two-thirds of OSU's 15,250 students received financial aid of some sort last year that helped them stay in school, President MacVicar noted.

State Schools Nearly Filled

There are still openings for Oregon undergraduate students at six of the State System of Higher Education institutions.

The schools are the University of Oregon, Oregon State University, Portland State University, Oregon College of Education, Eastern Oregon College and Oregon Technical Institute. Oregon State has set up a tentative cutoff date of Sept. 1, subject to review of enrollment totals.

The seventh school, Southern Oregon College, is closed to all applications by new students -- undergraduate resident, undergraduate nonresident and graduate.

Out-of-state students are feeling the pinch. Registration is closed to them at all State System institutions except Oregon College of Education.

There are still some spots open on the graduate level. Oregon State will receive applications until Sept. 1, subject to review. Eastern Oregon College is still open, and Oregon College of Education is compiling an alternate list.

Graduate school quotas are filled at the University of Oregon, Portland State University and at Southern Oregon College.

Admission notices are being sent out by all institutions to Oregon undergraduate students, out-of-state undergraduates who have met the deadline, and to graduate students who have been accepted.

SEN. HATFIELD ASKS DELAY IN FORMULA CHANGE

Senator Mark O. Hatfield has asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to delay the changing of the freight car payment formula from a per diem to a time-mileage formula.

In a telegram to Chairman George Stafford, Sen. Hatfield said that the change, which is now scheduled for Sept. 1, would have "an adverse effect on railroads and shippers in Oregon."

Hatfield asked for a delay so that a bill (S3223) which he and other Western Senators cosponsored can be acted upon.

He said that adoption of a time-mileage formula would aggravate the western rail car shortage problem although retention of the current per diem rate would not provide any long-range solutions.

Hatfield said that he is joining Senators Magnuson and Pearson in a joint letter to the national railroads asking for industry recommended solutions to the problem.

He pointed out that "Western railroads which back the per diem plan are today in a stronger position to push for solutions of this industry problem."

Gift-grants for the improvement of instruction and betterment of faculty (advanced training, travel to scientific meetings, etc.) totaled \$2,892,032. A breakdown showed \$2,553,278 from the federal government; \$319,550 from state agencies (such as the Oregon Educational Coordinating Council); and \$19,203 from individuals, foundations, and businesses.

Overall, \$12,328,876 of the \$14,179,000 year's total came from federal sources; \$626,978 from state and local support; and \$1,226,165 from private sources.

RULES OF THE ROAD, MORE ABOUT SPEED

The foundation of Oregon's speed law is the basic rule. It states that no person shall drive at a speed faster than is reasonable and prudent, considering traffic, surface and width of the highway, the dangers at intersections and other existing conditions, such as weather. It also prohibits driving at a speed greater than will permit you to control the car and to slow or stop to avoid an accident.

As the Oregon Driver's Manual points out, it is possible to violate the basic rule even though you may not be exceeding a designated or posted speed. For example, 55 is the designated speed for the open highway but driving at a speed of 55 miles per hour on an extremely foggy night or on an

ice covered road would not be in keeping with the basic rule provision of the law and could result in a citation.

A relatively new law also relates to the state's speed law, as well as to passing. It requires a driver of a slow-moving vehicle to pull off on a two-lane highway at the first safe place to let faster-moving traffic pass. The overtaking car must be obeying Oregon's speed law -- the basic rule -- but this does not mean, as some people have thought, that the driver cannot ever be traveling at a speed in excess of the designated or posted speed. He must only be driving in accordance with the basic rule provisions.



Flash Fire Injures Three
