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especially the big blues. Production is up in most areas. The high ridges in northeastern Oregon look especially promising, including the Chenimus, Innaha, Minam, Umattila, and southward through the upper Grande Ronde and John Day drainages. Best bet on the west will be in the Coast Range.

A banner year is predicted on chukars and quail. In some areas shooting will be spotty but generally production is up and broods are large. Average shooting will be enjoyed in sections of northeastern Oregon such as the Snake and Powder drainages, improving as you go south into the Malheur country.

Valley quail production is especially high in Malheur, Harney, and Lake counties, a remarkable recovery from the heavy mortality two winters ago. Grouse County also has a good supply of quail.

Best bets for chukars will be through the lower breaks of the Deschutes and John Day rivers and in most of the Malheur drainage. Fine production is noted in the Steens and Owyhee canyons.

Waterfowl gunners can also expect a fine shooting year. Production is up on the northern breeding grounds as well as our own local marshlands. Canada goose production is especially good. Mallards, pintails, widgons brought off large broods of youngsters. The forecast is for excellent flights of ducks and geese in Oregon this fall.

Picking a hot spot is out of the question as the birds are expected to funnel into all marshlands of the state. Hunters will not go wrong in such areas as the Malheur River and Snake, Lakeview, Warner Valley, Summer Lake, Malheur Refuge, Klamath Marshlands, popular Savvie Island, pothole marshes in the Willamette Valley, or the numerous marshland areas along the coast. The Columbia Basin will be a top gunning area late in the season.

Upland game bird and waterfowl seasons are long and generous. Hunters are urged to check the regulations booklet for dates, bag limits, and other rules. Regulations booklets for big game are available at all license agencies. The upland bird regulations booklets should be available about the fourth week in September.

Art Exhibit At County Library

Twenty-seven art instructors from the community colleges of Oregon are exhibiting work at the Malheur County Library through September.

This exhibition, organized by Treasure Valley Community College for showing throughout Oregon, will travel to nine other locations within the State. Of the forty-five pieces on exhibit are many from well-known instructors who have lived and worked in Oregon for years as well as many from younger, newer instructors, some of whom are showing for the first time in Oregon.

Local work has been included by Kenneth and Gwyneth O'Connell, Jim and Joan Lehman, Gerry and Julie Remmerde, Pete Stark and Roger Baker.

The show offers local viewers an opportunity to see kinds of work not often displayed in this area. Among the works are oil and acrylic paintings, watercolors, pen and pencil drawings, wheel thrown and handbuilt pottery, plaster, wooden and bronze cast sculpture, jewelry, weaving and calligraphy.

This is a show of significance, one of the most important to come to Ontario this year and represents the first time that the community colleges have joined together for the purpose of holding such a show, according to Roger Baker who was instrumental in gathering the works. It represents an effort by Treasure Valley Community College to promote knowledge of artists from across the state to residents throughout Oregon and to make better known the work of the eleven community colleges. It is hoped that many area residents will be able to see this exhibit before it leaves its trip around the State, added Baker.
