NORTHWEST TRAVEL IS PROMOTED

Alex Creek of Idaho Falls, chairman of the Advisory Council for the Idaho Department of Commerce and Development, is now serving as president for the Pacific Northwest Travel Association, following this group's annual convention held last week at Minot, North Dakota.

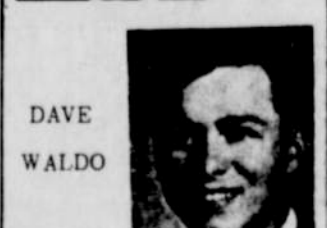
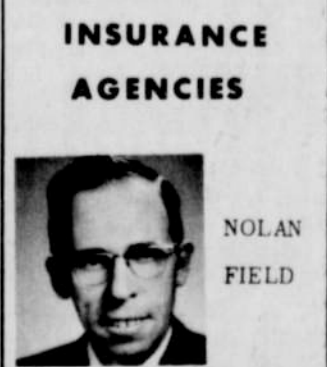
