

Welcome, Governor McCall!

Governor Tom McCall will be a Nyssa visitor Thursday (today), and it is a privilege for us to welcome him to our community and area.

It's very seldom that we see the governor of our state in Eastern Oregon, and we commend the governor for making an appearance here. We think it is particularly important that he is taking the time to visit with our school children, because they need to know who our chief executive is, and need to know how our political system works.

Governor McCall made a major speech to the peace officers of Oregon, Idaho and Washington last night at Baker, but primarily he is on a political campaign swing. So many politicians running for state office completely ignore this part of the state, and it isn't right. While we are a relatively small part of the Oregon population, we are still Oregonians, and those in high office need to know our problems and be familiar with this part of the state.

It may be potentially expedient for campaigners to spend their time in Western Oregon and the Willamette Valley where most of the people live, but exposure over the entire state can make a difference in a close election. We suspect that Bob Packwood is U.S. Senator now because he took the time to campaign all over Oregon two years ago, while Wayne Morse stayed pretty close to the population centers.

Political campaigns give the voters a chance to see and hear the candidates, but more important, we think, the candidates must lay their records and programs on the line and face the issues and the public.

Governor McCall is taking his time to come to this area and meet our people. We urge everyone who can possibly get away to see and hear the governor at the school assembly today, Thursday, October 22 at 12:50 p.m. He is a politician seeking re-election, but he is also the chief executive of this state. The problems he has faced in the past four years have been terrific, and there is little indication that they will be less in the next four years.

Come out and greet Governor McCall, and show our real Eastern Oregon hospitality.
