### LEAGUE OF OREGON CITIES OPPOSES MEASURE NO. 11

The legislative committee of the League of Oregon Cities has agreed unanimously to go on record in opposition to Ballot Measure No. 11, the proposal to restrict authority of counties and the state legislature in zoning and building regulations in areas outside cities.

At a meeting in Portland, the committee listed at least three reasons for city officials and residents of cities to be concerned about and opposed to the

measure, even though it is limited to areas outside cities: (1) Measure No. 11 would effectively deny residents of cities, who are also residents of counties, any opportunity to express themselves through their county governing bodies on building, zoning and subdivision regulations needed to help assure orderly growth and development of an entire area.

(2) Many areas adjacent to cities will in the future be annexed to cities as they reach a level of development where city services are needed. Cities will therefore inherit responsibility for problems in these areas resulting from development without adequate zoning, building and subdivision regulations.

(3) Before becoming effective in areas outside cities, state laws affecting building, zoning and subdivision regulation would have to be ratified by voters in those areas. However, voters inside cities would not have any similar option to ratify the same state laws before they would become effective inside cities.
