

There's good news for hunters, fishermen and other visitors Auxiliary Announces to the T.E. Roach Hells Canyon development. Idaho Power Company has finished installing a modern concrete deck on its bridge across the Snake River below Brownlee Dam and the span once again is open to traffic. The new deck, its roadway paved with asphalt, replaces the bridge's original timber surface and includes a fenced walkway for pedestrians and fishermen on its downstream side at right. During the company's \$180,000 modernization project, traffic was detoured across the top of the dam. Brownlee Bridge is one of two Snake River spans Idaho Power built as part of the Hells Canyon development. The other, located below Oxbow Dam, connects with a surfaced highway on the Idaho side of the river that the company also constructed to provide the only access into the heart of Hells Canyon.
