Here is what the Driver's worked 25 hours and pins to Manual says about the right-

> "Where traffic is not controlled by signs, signals or policemen, you must give right-ofway to vehicles on your right even though you might enter the intersection first.

"The driver of a vehicle entering a freeway or other arterial highway where an acceleration or merging lane is provided for his use must give rightof-way to vehicles already on the freeway or other arterial highway," The freeway rule is a new requirement, approved by the 1969 Legislature.

What do you do at a fourway stop street? Common courtesy and the right-of-way law should dictate who proceeds first. The car that stops first should be permitted to proceed first. If in doubt, yield to the car on your right.

Before entering a through highway you must stop and, if traffic is present, give rightof-way to other vehicles on the highway if they present an immediate danger. A "vield right of way" sign means re-

duce speed and yield to traffic on the street or highway you are entering or crossing. One final word about right-

of-way. If you enter an intersection at an unlawful speed, you forfeit your right-of-way.
