MINUTES OF THE MALHEUR COUNTY COURT - NOVEMBER 4, 1970:

The Court met with Judge White presiding and Commissioners E. W. Maag and Henry Esplin present.

Approved by resolution to bill the City of Nyssa for the use of the Lytle Land Dump for the months of January, 1970 through June 30, 1970, September and October, 1970 and further authorized the County Auditor to bill the City \$200.00 for each future month use of the dump. The Auditor was also authorized to cash the check in the amount of \$400 for the months of July and August.

Authorized Jean P. Bond, County Treasurer, to offer the salary as specified in the salary classification survey to a new employee in her office.

Accepted the bid of Harold A. Bender, Sr. to install an oil furnace in the Malheur County Shop for a total sum of \$1,895.

Approved by resolution a supplemental budget in the amount of \$2,000 for the District Attorney's Investigation fund.

The Court agreed to tour the Harper area on Friday, November 24, 1970.

MEETING OF THE COUNTY COURT - NOVEMBER 9, 1970: The Court met in regular session with Judge White presiding and Commissioners E. W. Maag and Henry Esplin present.

GRANTED authority to Walt Gillespie and Carl Sperling to go with a representative from the Vail Construction Company, and measure the one and one-half (1-1/2) minus and chip gravel that was left from a work job done by such Company, which the County Road Department is to purchase at the \$7.00 per yard, this being in the Brogan area. They are also to measure all the gravel located at the Annex Site which was processed by Earl Barton.

APPROVED Order No. 14, in the Matter of Payment of Claims, hereby ordering the County Auditor to issue warrants totaling \$58,655.27.

The Court signed an Order hereby calling for a dog pound and the care of dogs for the year January 1, 1971 to December 31, 1971. Bids must be submitted to the office of the County Court, by 2:00 p.m., November 30, 1970.

APPROVED by resolution that the Court would deliver to the General Assembly and the President of the Association of Oregon Counties that the County Court of Malheur County is opposed to the accelerating salaries of the Executive Secretary and other staff members of the AOC; and, that increases for personnel of the AOC should be based upon the Bureau of Labor Statistics Cost of Living Index.

MEETING OF THE MALHEUR COUNTY COURT - NOVEMBER 24, 1970: The Court met in regular session with Judge White presiding and Commissioners E. W. Maag and Henry Esplin present.

APPROVED by motion that the Court initiate a petition to close a gravel pit in Section 21, T. 18 S., R. 45 E., W. 4 M. A hearing date has been set for December 30, at 10 a.m.

Richard D. Hevner and the Malheur County Road Department signed an agreement that in consideration the County shall be allowed to remove such manufactured or crushed gravel as may be situated upon the following described property: NE1/4NE1/4 Sec. 25, T 15 S., R. 42 E., W. 4 M.

An agreement was signed between the State of Oregon, Malheur County and the City of Vale whereby, the city proposes to undertake the following outdoor recreation project: Treasure Valley Park Lighting; with an estimated total cost of \$2,704 which is reimbursed by 50% of Federal Matching Funds.

An Agreement was signed by and between the State of Oregon, Malheur County and the City of Ontario, Oregon, whereby, the City proposed to undertake the following outdoor recreation project: Treasure Valley Park Lighting; with an estimated total cost of \$8,215.46 which is reimbursed by 50 percent of Federal Matching Funds.
