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### Open Letter To TVCC President And Board

Dear Dr. Skinner:

The Nyssa School Board, at a special session held on January 5, 1971, directed me to write this open letter to you concerning the Nyssa Opportunity Center and related matters. The Board commends the TVCC Board of Directors for taking its recent action in discharging certain personnel who were employed in the Migrant Education programs. The Nyssa Board encourages TVCC to hire replacement personnel for the Nyssa Opportunity Center after careful screening of applicants so as to select personnel who are sincerely dedicated to the proposition that the economic level of those persons served by the center should be improved through education in cooperation with established institutions and without regard to race, culture or ancestral derivation.

The Nyssa Board is of the opinion that the former migrants who live in Malheur County have been well received in local communities. Considerable community effort has and is being made to improve the economic status of these citizens and the great majority of the former migrants appreciate these efforts and are taking advantage of the opportunities offered. The Migrant Education program sponsored by TVCC is one of these community efforts and the Nyssa Board recommends that TVCC continue the sponsorship of the program for another fiscal year. It may be advisable to reduce the program to include only Malheur County programs so that Idaho communities can arrange responsible sponsorship of the programs in their areas.

Much of the publicity given to the recent events in Nyssa has given the impression that a few former employees of the Nyssa Opportunity Center and visiting OEO employees from Colorado and elsewhere, speak for and represent the thinking of all of the former migrants in this area. This is not so. Actually the great majority of the former migrants have refused to engage in the militant efforts of these few people whose approach seemed

to be directed in dividing the community into so-called ethnic groups.

The Nyssa Board wishes to express its sincere appreciation to these former migrants who have steadfastly remained loyal to the community in which they have chosen to reside. The Board pledges to them and to all the other members of the community to continue to operate the Nyssa Schools on the basis of equal opportunity for all. We shall cooperate with TVCC in providing a program at the Nyssa Opportunity Center on the same basis.

### BLM To Sell Public Land

Eighty acres of public land situated on Hansen Butte three miles west of Murtaugh, Idaho in Twin Falls County will be offered for sale by the Bureau of Land Management on January 20, 1971. The land, which will be sold at public auction, is zoned for agricultural use under Twin Falls County zoning ordinances.

The sale will be made under provisions of the Public Land Sale Act of September 1964 which gives any individual the right to participate. The appraised value of the property is \$5200.

#### 20 YEARS AGO

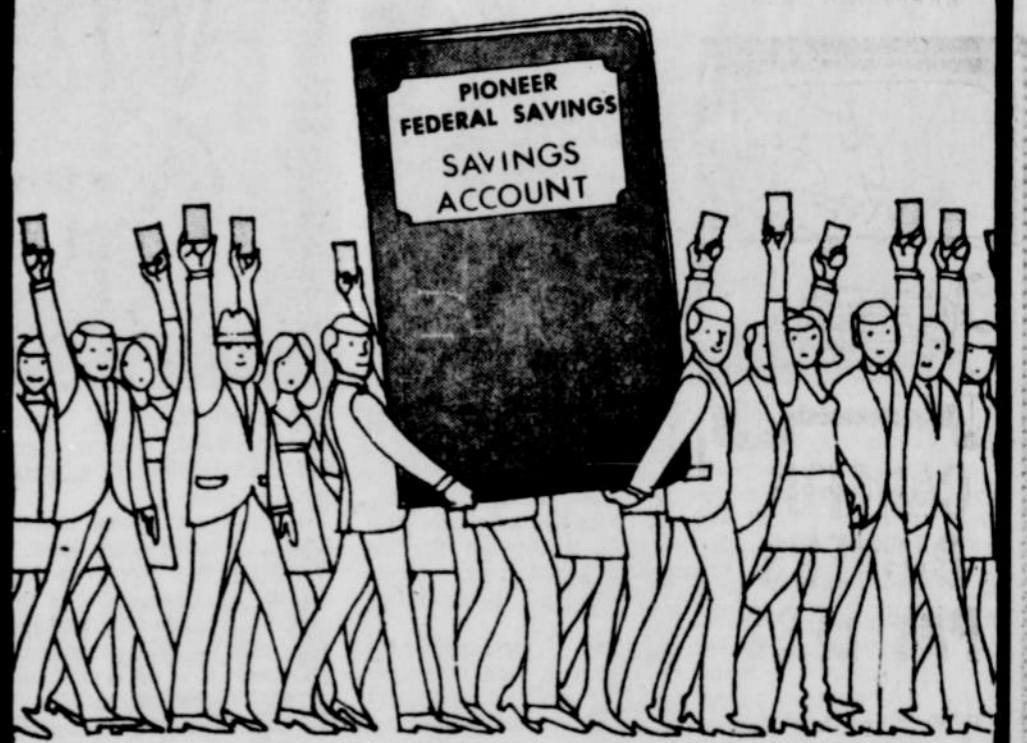
