

Janet Nedry-David Hartwig Wed In Nyssa Episcopal Church



On Sunday, January 3, 1971, at 2 p.m., Janet Elizabeth Nedry became the bride of David Morgan Hartwig, at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Nyssa.

The marriage was solemnized by the Rev. John K. Worrall in the presence of relatives and close friends of the couple. During the ceremony a reading "The Greatest of These is Love" from the 13th Chapter of St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians, was given by Tom Banks.

Altar flowers were large white and pastel orange mums. Pampas grass of orange and white added to the church decor.

Parents of the newlyweds are Mr. and Mrs. Dirick Nedry of Nyssa, Mrs. Arthur Zillig of Anchorage, Alaska and John Hartwig of Caldwell. Escorted to the altar and given in marriage by her father the bride wore a floor-length Juliet gown of ivory wool jersey. The fitted bodice was accented by a cummerbund trimmed with ivory lace. The gown featured a stand-up collar and long full sleeves gathered into deep cuffs with self covered buttons. The semi full skirt was complimented with streamers of pastel orange and gold ribbons, that hung from the waist. The gown designed by the bride was made by her mother.
