Despite a torrid 27 points in the second quarter, Nyssa was edged 77-73 by Emmett Saturday evening in a SRV conference battle on the Huskies' home court.

Going into the second quarter trailing 21-12, the Bulldogs rallied to lead the Huskies at half-time, 39-33. The attack was led by reserve forward Paul Trost, who came off the bench to sink 12 points during the second period.

The Huskies regained the lead, 60-56 at the third-quarter mark, and held their 4 point lead to the end of the contest.
