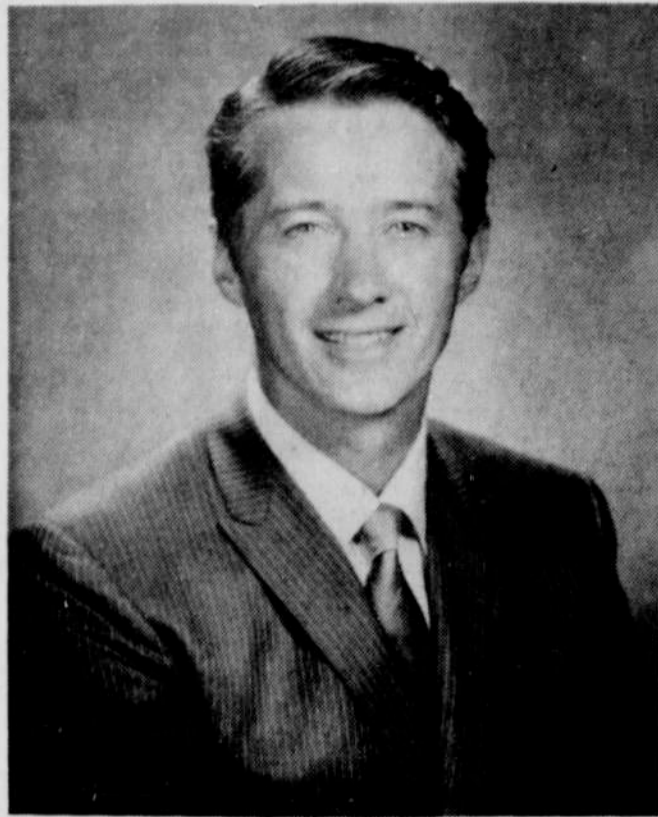


FORMER AGNOSTIC TO OPEN MISSIONARY CONFERENCE



A four-day Bible-Missionary Conference will begin this evening, January 21, at the Nyssa Conservative Baptist Church with missionaries to Hong Kong and Italy participating. A missionary to the Ivory Coast and a mission society representative will also be included in succeeding services.

The first speaker of the evening will be Miss Sharon Mitchell. For the past three years Miss Mitchell has worked in a variety of positions on the staff of the Oregonian Publishing Company in Portland. She was recently accepted by CBFMS to serve in the missionary publishing house in Naples, Italy.

Larry Allen will be the second speaker of the evening. A former aeronautical engineer, Allen has said, "As a successful businessman I was a self-styled agnostic. I was involved in a worker-consumer treadmill that was everything a successful agnostic wishes. But my life seemed futile".

After surrendering his life to Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, Allen went to Western Baptist Seminary in Portland

and is now ready to go to Hong Kong as a missionary. He will speak again Friday night.

Allen will be joined by Dr. Kenneth Cummings for the second meeting of the conference. Dr. Cummings is the Northwest Representative of CBFMS with offices in Portland. A former missionary to Portugal and a popular Bible conference and missionary speaker, he will present the Bible message of the evening.

Miss Alma Steinhauer will be the featured speaker Saturday night. She taught in Oregon schools for several years before going to Brazil to teach missionary children in the 1969-70 school year. She has been appointed to teach in Ivory Coast Academy, Africa.

Miss Steinhauer will tell about her missionary experiences Saturday morning, give her testimony of God's leading in her life. Pastor Aruthur Coast will present a Bible message Sunday morning on the subject "The Missionary Challenge".

The conference will conclude Sunday evening with Miss Sharon Mitchell returning to tell more about her training at Multnomah School of the Bible in Portland and plans for her work in Italy.

All evening services of the conference will begin at 7:30 p.m. The Sunday morning service will be at the usual 11 a.m. time. The speakers will use slide projectors and other visual aids to help explain their work. Each of them will be house guests of members of the congregation and available for personal conferences during the daytime hours or after the services.
