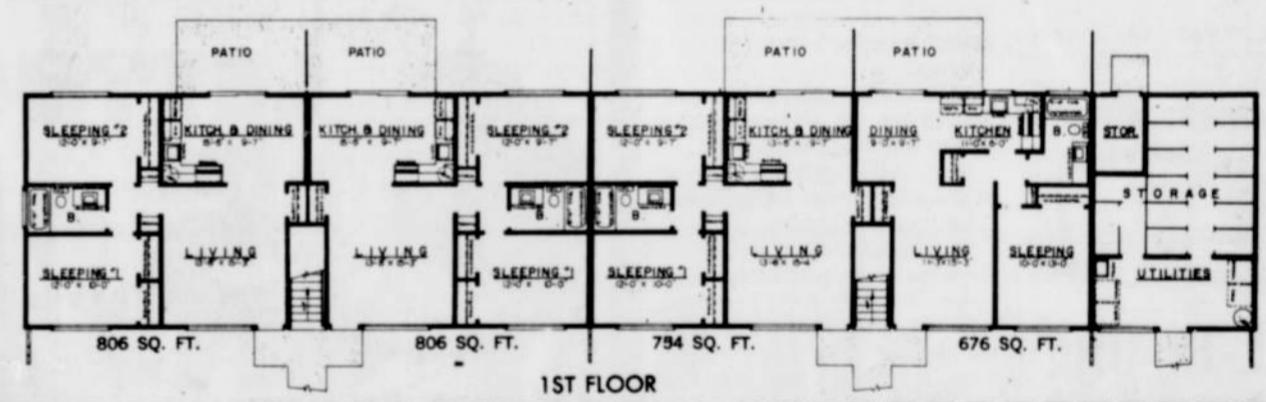
In the top photo the wooden bridge to

Albertson Island from the mainland is shown, with part of the flooded island in the background. Roads were under water and the roadbed of the bridge has just been covered with sawdust in preparation for the moving of over 1,000 head of cattle to higher ground.

The lower photo shows the highway bridge from Idaho into Nyssa, with the terrific amount of water flowing under it as the Snake River reached the high water level a week ago.
