**Math Course For Teachers**

The College of Idaho mathematics department has been awarded a National Science Foundation grant for an inservice institute next summer for junior high school teachers.

The grant of \$19,652 is the fourteenth NSF grant received by the mathematics department since 1962, and brings the total of support funds from NSF to that of I department to \$187,052, according to Prof. Boyd Henry, head of the department.

The course is designed for curriculum development for low achievers and the terms of the grant call for a four-week conference on the C of I campus June 21- July 16, 9 a.m.-4 p.m., for junior high school teachers and administrators of math who will be given the opportunity to use the techniques presented in at least one class on an experimental basis. Monthly follow-up meetings will be conducted during the ensuing academic year for evaluation of the effectiveness of the curriculum.

Each supporting district will be responsible for all expenses of instruction in the junior high classroom, with workbooks for each student or the use of overhead transparencies a necessity, Henry said.

The summer conference will make wide use of the material in this field developed by the University of Illinois during the past ten years under NSF grants.
