OREGON WILDLIFE

APPOINTS DIRECTOR

In unprecedented action at the 34th annual convention of the Oregon Wildlife Federation in Corvallis January 17, the Board of Directors voted unanimously to establish the position of paid Executive Director and appointed George Reed of Baker to this full-time position. Reed is widely known for his conservation work in Oregon and nationally. He has been in the forefront of conservation and environmental issues for the past 15 years. He served as president of the Powder River Sportsmen's Club and as president of the Oregon Wildlife Federation as well as chairman of the NWF Affiliate Affairs Committee. Reed is a native Oregonian and was born and raised in the Eugene area. For the past 21 years he has been a successful businessman in Baker. Reed recently sold his business and retired so he could spend more time working as a citizen in the natural resource field. The rationale behind the change from an all-volunteer organization for the state's largest conservation group to one with a full-time paid executive director is to provide greater leadership for affiliate clubs and individual members, maximum cooperation with other conservation groups, and to place the Federation in a more favorable position to deal effectively with Oregon's natural resource and environmental problems. The Federation will establish a permanent office in the Portland-Salem area in the near future.

Some papers can be re-cycled up to nine times, reports Georgia-Pacific Corp. The company has nine plants which use former waste paper as raw material for specialized products.

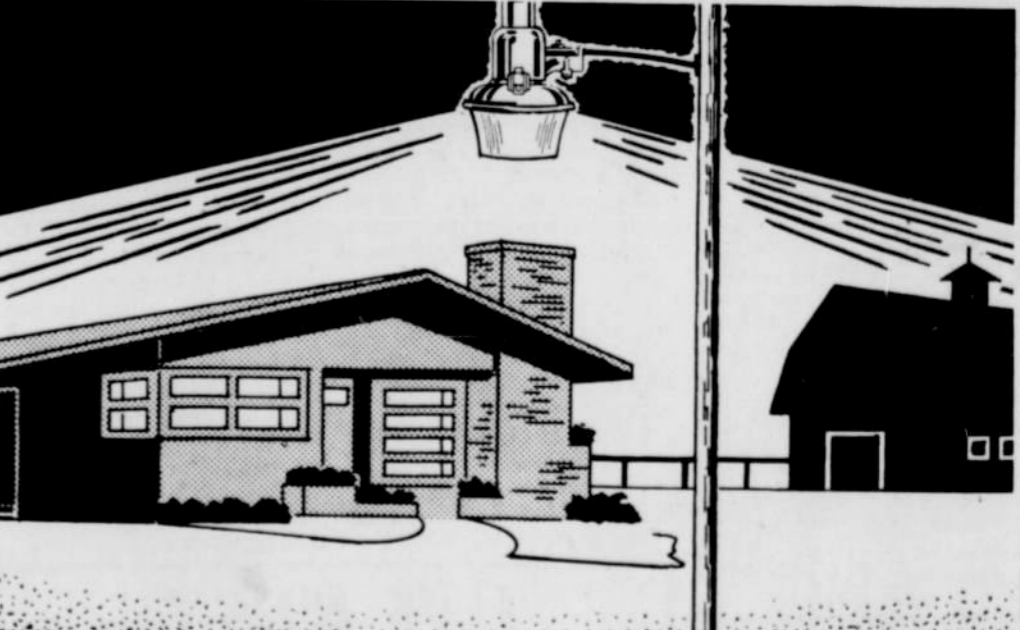
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
