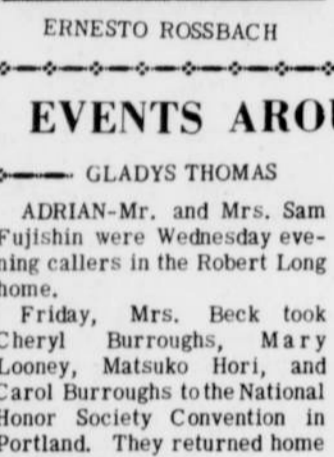

Ray Russels Tell Of Mexico Experiences

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Russell spent from November 30 until January 18 traveling in their camper in what they expressed as a very interesting and educational trip to Mexico.

They left Nyssa and went directly to Oxnard, Calif., where they were joined by Mrs. Russell's sister's family, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Kirby and daughter, Tracy. The five of them then proceeded from Nogales on to Guadalajara.

Their route included the cities from Nogales to Hermosillo, Guaymas, Ciudad Obregon, Navjon, Las Mochas, Culiacan, on to Mazatlan. From Mazatlan, they took a side trip to San Blas to Tepic and then on to Guadalajara where they spent 10 days.

In Guadalajara, they met Dr. and Mrs. Louie Maulding and spent Christmas together. Other than enjoying the company of home town friends, Mrs. Russell said it was just fabulous the way the other traveler visitors and residents decorated in such unique ways for Christmas. At that time, they enjoyed 80 degree weather.

One trip they made on a Sunday from Guadalajara into Magdalena was most interesting to them. In this small town they saw some of the most interesting mine opals. At the filling station, the little old women have small boxes of polished opals for sale and quite often will trade them to a person for almost any article of clothing. They seem to need clothing more than anything else there.

Mrs. Russell described her trip in the following manner: Our trip to Mexico was very interesting. We saw poverty we couldn't believe existed, but we also saw many prosperous communities.

About half-way down from the border at Nogales to Guadalajara, we found nice farming, which was most interesting to us. The towns of Las Mochas and Ciudad Obregon had beautiful fields so pretty and green. They raise many vegetables there. Some farms have all modern equipment while others have the very crudest methods, such as old fashioned plows being pulled by a very thin underfed horse with the man walking behind.

We saw burros loaded down with huge sacks of dry corn headed for market. It made a person wonder how the burro could walk under the heavy load.

People there are lucky to have such a warm climate. Their clothing was skimpy and their homes or shacks often lacked doors or windows and had dirt floors. Naturally not all of them have this type of house. Their houses differed just as their farming did. Some of

their homes were quite comfortable.

The women seemed to be constantly washing. Mrs. Russell said, but one can see why, for with all the inconveniences they have, it is next to impossible to keep things clean. We saw women by the river washing near the large rocks and they would spread their clothes on bushes to dry.

We spent a week end at Guaymas and had our first experience with a hairdresser. It was a somewhat different experience than having one's hair done here. Mrs. Russell said that she, her sister and niece all had a shampoo and set. They heated the water there in a bucket with an electric coil and used the same brush and comb for all three of them before and after the shampoo.

We enjoyed the shopping in Mazatlan and also the beach there.

The many cathedrals in the towns are very old. Some of the murals on the inside walls and ceilings are magnificent. Most all of the people are very religious. One sees them going in and out of church all hours of the day.

The large market in Guadalajara was really something to see. It covers several blocks and everything is under one roof. A person can buy almost anything there (except a small notebook). I never found one in any town in Mexico. Their paper is very scarce and any purchase you make is wrapped in newspaper. We learned quickly to buy one of the large plastic mesh bags with plastic handles to carry our purchases in. Almost every Mexican you see has one of these bags.

One of the highlights of the trip was a side trip to San Blas. It was right on the ocean and quite tropical. We took a three and one-half hour boat ride up Ciudad Obregon had beautiful fields so pretty and green. They raise many vegetables there.
