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## TVCC BUDGET FAILS BY 24 VOTES, NEW PROPOSAL REDUCED BY \$23,333

Voters of the Treasure Valley Community College Education District turned down the 1971-72 budget at the election last Friday by 24 votes. The official tally was 1,298 YES votes and 1,322 NO votes.

The college board of directors met in a special session Tuesday, and set March 11 as the election date to seek approval for the budget. In the meantime, the budget committee pared the budget by \$23,333 from the amount that was turned down Friday.

They agreed to place a \$10 increase on tuition, which will raise approximately \$24,000; and reduced the increase in salaries by one percent, which will cut another \$9,000 from the budget.

Of this \$33,000, \$12,000 will be retained in the income to replace funds which the college anticipates it will lose from dropping the OEO program.

Total tax to be raised will be \$608,689, down from the \$632,689 figure submitted to voters last week.

Previously the board had asked that a five percent raise be granted to the faculty for cost of living increases, but this has been reduced to a four percent raise request.

The tax levy is set at \$2.61 per \$1,000 true cash value, down from \$2.71 asked for the proposed budget last week and \$2.86 approved by the voters a year ago.

## Succor Creek Road Approved

The State Highway Commission today approved adding the Succor Creek route in Eastern Oregon to the state highway system.

The designation adds the 32-mile Succor Creek Section to the 20.11 miles of the existing Nyssa-Adrian Secondary Highway (ORE201). It renames the entire route the "Succor Creek Secondary Highway."

The termini of the new state highway will be at the junction of the Central Oregon Primary Highway (US20) in Nyssa, and at the junction of the I.O.N. Secondary Highway (US95) near the Malloy Ranch.

## AMPUTEE SKIER TALKS TO LIONS

Ken Meier, trust officer for the First National Bank of Oregon from Salem, was the speaker at the Nyssa Lions Club meeting Tuesday.

Meier talked and showed films on amputee skiing. An amputee himself, Meier is one of the authorities and champion skiers on the technique for amputees, and conducts classes and is willing to help anyone who has lost a leg and still wants to engage in this sport.

## BULLDOGS SLAY ANIMALS IN WRESTLING, WIN "A" LEAGUE CROWN IN SRV

The underdog Nyssa Bulldogs soundly thrashed the touted "Animals" of Ontario High School Tuesday evening on the home mat, and in doing so won the Championship Trophy for the Treasure Valley A League, which consists of teams from Boise, Borah, Capitol, Caldwell, Ontario, Vale and Nyssa.

Reportedly unable to find adequate competition during the wrestling campaign, the Animals found it in abundance Tuesday as they lost to the Bulldogs by a 30-17 score.

Nyssa built up a 16 point lead in the early going as Scott Kido, 98 pounds, decided McKintyre; Richard Beck, 106 pounds, pinned Cramer in the 2nd; Mark Hartley, 115 pounds, pinned Moeller in the 1st, and Manuel Perez, 123 pounds, decided Grove.

Ontario earned 6 points in the next two matches as Hiariano decided Kirk Cleaver and Maeda decided Chris Moore in the 130 and 136 pound events.

Kyle Lassiter decided L. Dols at 141 pounds, and Tom Huffman decided R. Dols at 148 pounds. Ontario reversed the trend again with Plaza getting a decision over Mark Peterson at 157 pounds, and Don Sappe held Schaffeld to a decision at 168 pounds. Schaffeld is undefeated, and the less experienced Bulldog wrestler won somewhat of a moral victory.

Then Coach Mel Calhoun's strategy paid off as Jay Gibson gave away almost 20 pounds to Butch Watanabe of Ontario in the 179 pound match. The lighter Gibson out-hustled and out-wrestled Watanabe for an 8-7 victory in the key match of the evening.

The Wilman brothers finished up the matches, with Phil pinning Holland in the 1st round at 191 pounds; then Recla pinning Chris in the 2nd in the heavyweight match for Ontario's final 5 points, which by this time were too little and too late.

This victory before an almost capacity crowd, which included a large contingent of Ontario rooters, was probably the highlight of the regular season for the Bulldogs. The last home match will be tonight (Thursday) against Vale before the teams enter district and state competition.

## Infectious Hepatitis Scattered

There have been many questions coming to the Health Department regarding several cases of hepatitis in the county at the present time. Some fear has been expressed these cases may be centered in the schools. Investigation shows no center of infection since cases are scattered one in each of several schools and one an adult, with no school connection. These cases are not in anyway connected.

Dr. David W. Sarazin, County Health officer, says that infectious hepatitis is a virus disease which sometimes attacks the liver. It's incubation period is highly variable ranging from two weeks to two months, which makes finding a source more difficult. It is a disease harbored in the alimentary tract and is thought to pass from one to another, only in household type contact. For example: through food prepared by someone carrying the disease or through common use of bathroom facilities. The best means of prevention are careful hand washing after toilet use and always before eating, cleanliness of kitchens, bathrooms and in the preparation of food. There is some evidence of person to person spread, but the disease is not readily contagious.

Persons who are living in the household of anyone having the disease should contact the family doctor.

Gamma Globulin is not readily available and is not usually given where the only association is in social contact, such as being in the same room in school, riding the same bus, playing together or attending socials, meetings or clubs together. The disease is not thought to be spread in this way.

## State Highway Funds Distributed

The semiannual apportioning of the State Highway Fund to the incorporated cities of Oregon was announced today by the State Highway Commission. Funds to be released by the Commission total \$6,907,034.37, which will be distributed to 228 incorporated cities in Oregon whose population now totals 1,168,356. The allocation is based on the statutory 12 percent for the period July 1 through December 31, 1970.

The funds come from the following sources: motor vehicle registration and operators' license fees, gasoline tax, use fuel tax, motor carrier fees, and fines and penalties collected for violations of the size and weight statutes where complaints are made by Highway Division weighmasters.

Nyssa, with a population of 2,620, will receive \$15,208.49.
