Heart Attack Warning Symptoms Outlined

10,000 Oregon volunteers will visit homes across the state this coming weekend to distribute information that may help prevent many needless deaths from heart attack.

Thousands of Oregonians die of heart attack each year because they don't know the symptoms and wait too long to get medical care, says the Oregon Heart Association. Among the 10,276 persons who die each year of heart attack, more than half succumb before they reach a hospital where their chances for survival would be improved.

Leaflets to be distributed note that minutes can count when heart attack strikes, and warn that delay can cost a life if there is not prompt action once certain symptoms develop.

While symptoms vary, the Oregon Heart Association notes that the usual warning signs of heart attack include:

- Prolonged, oppressive pain or unusual discomfort in the center of chest, behind the breastbone.
- Pain may radiate to the shoulder, arm, neck or jaw.
- The pain or discomfort is often accompanied by sweating, nausea, vomiting and shortness

of breath may also occur. These warnings call for immediate action as follows:

1. Call the physician and carefully describe the symptoms.
2. If the doctor is not immediately available, get the patient to a hospital emergency room at once.

The symptoms may ease up, but then return, the Oregon Heart Association notes. It urges quick action when the first warning signs appear, and says the decision to obtain help is too important to be left to the patient's judgment alone. It is also the responsibility of the wife, husband, relative or friend.

Knowing the facts of heart attack, and acting promptly may save a life, the Association says.
