The registration fee is \$3.00 per person or \$4.50 for husbands and wives. Should a cancellation be made before the workshop begins, a refund will be made.

Ken Wright of Springfield, manager of the Springfield branch, First National Bank of Oregon, will serve as chairman of the April Cancer Crusade of the American Cancer Society's Oregon division, according to Dr. Harvey Baker, division president.

Wright will be assisted by Worth W. Caldwell Jr., of Portland, who will be vice-chairman. Caldwell is a former chairman of the division's Multnomah county unit.

Winner of the Oregon State Finals will be flown, with chaperone to Palisades Park, New Jersey in September of 1971 to compete in the National Finals--all of her expenses will be paid. A trip for state winners is planned to Staten Island, United Nations Building, etc. Fifty states will be represented at the National Finals.
