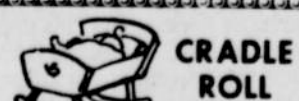
Samba Group Meets

Work Smarter --- Not Harder

That handy wooden cutting board in your kitchen can be a breeding ground for bacteria that cause food poisoning, warns Mrs. Judith Forest, OSU Extension food and nutrition specialist.

Thorough washing with soap and hot water will remove grease and food particles. To kill germs flood the board with a liberal amount of chlorine bleach solution. Three tablespoons of bleach per quart of water is adequate strength.

Disinfecting the board is important after preparation of raw meat or poultry or other foods.

Thinking about mobile home living? First, where will you put it—in a mobile home park or on a lot of your own? What size do you need? What room arrangement would you like? These and many other questions are answered in a new bulletin "Choosing a Mobile Home". It's yours free for the asking. Call your county Extension office.

Four and one-half pounds of trash a day around the house isn't a pleasant thought. Still, that's what the average home accumulates.

One way to get rid of it is with an appliance known as the trash compactor. It will squeeze your trash accumulation into one fourth its size. In other words, four cans of trash will be cut down to one can in a neat plastic bag.

You drop trash into a drawer, close it and a special deodorant is sprayed into the drawer. Flip the switch and a pressure of 2,000 pounds compresses the trash in just 60 seconds. It will handle most dry items including bottles, milk cartons and tin cans.

As a safety measure, the appliance will not operate when the drawer is open. A special safety key and sliding door covering the controls discourages children's tampering.

Confused about which label to believe on bottle diet drinks? Even though cyclamates were removed from all diet drinks as of January 1, 1970, bottles will carry old labels until October 1, 1972, according to Mrs. Judith Forest, OSU Extension food and nutrition specialist. For correct current product information on calorie and carbo-

hydrate content per fluid ounce of diet drink, read the information on the carton and bottle cap.

Elaine Carlson, OSU Extension clothing specialist, gives a helpful hint to those who sew. If twisting and fraying thread frustrates you when threading a needle, try threading as it comes from the spool to prevent going against the natural twist of the thread.

If you run out of dishwashing detergent for your dishwasher, don't try a substitute. Only detergents made especially for dishwashers should be used in the machine. Other types suds too much and slow down washing action, and may be detrimental to the dishwasher itself.

Because the sides and rim around a dishwasher door are sealed off from the dishwashing action, these areas should be suds-cleaned from time to time to remove accumulated residue.

The newer types of self-polishing floor wax are shinier and longer lasting, which is what many consumers have been asking for. But as often happens, one problem gets solved and

another pops up. This time the complaint is that the wax is hard to remove.

Stripping wax buildup needn't be a back breaking job. Remove the wax after three or four waxings. Use very hot water, plenty of detergent or a floor cleaner that claims to remove wax.

Or you can use 1/2 to 1 cup ammonia and 1 cup detergent to a gallon of very hot water. Apply to a small area at a time, wait two or three minutes, then mop up. After the entire floor is stripped, rinse thoroughly. Put on a thin coat of fresh wax after the floor is completely dry.

Non-stick pans used for the first time should be pre-conditioned. Wipe the non-stick surface with a paper towel soaked in cooking oil or shortening.

This is important for new bakeware, fry pans and griddles but not for angel food cake pans. However, if you're using a new type pan with non-stick finish for holiday fruit cakes or fancy yeast breads, it should be pre-conditioned the same as other bakeware.
