Veterans Must Apply For Property Tax Exemptions

Disabled war veterans and veterans' widows must apply for their annual Oregon property tax exemptions by April 1, the Department of Veterans' Affairs

cautioned today. Application is filed with the county assessor. The exemption amounts to \$7,500 of the true cash value of the property. Those entitled include:

1. War veterans 40 percent or more disabled. Any person who had military service for not less than 210 consecutive days, any part after January 31, 1955, now qualifies as a war veteran under Oregon law. Veterans of previous wars need only 90 days of wartime service.
2. Unmarried widows of war veterans.

Spanish-American War veterans qualify regardless of disability.

The person who got the exemption last year and neglects to apply this year will be notified by the county assessor by April 10, and will be given until May 1 to apply by paying a \$10 late-filing fee. Also, the disabled veteran or widow is given 20 days after receipt from the assessor of notice of increased property valuation to apply for the exemption if he or she had not already applied.

A separate benefit is provided for disabled veterans and widows residing in mobile homes, consisting of an annual license fee reduction of up to \$100. Application for this benefit is filed with the Department of Motor Vehicles, at the time of applying for the annual license renewal.

1971 Highway Map Available

The cover of Oregon's official highway map for 1971 offers a complete departure from recent styles by featuring a replica of the state seal on a solid blue background.

Another added feature of the new map is the depicting of the driving restrictions on Oregon's beaches by means of color coding. The new regulations went into effect last season and the listing on the map should enable persons unfamiliar with them to stay within the law.

The portions of the rivers which compose the Scenic Rivers Waterways System are appropriately designated. A symbol shows State Parks active in the reservation program.

The map has been updated to include the latest road changes, important traffic regulations, tips for trailer owners, special information for motorists, and a mileage chart of in-state points as well as distances from Portland to other major cities out-of-state. There is also an index to cities and towns with 1969 population figures. As special aids to motorists, there are 18 inset maps of various Oregon cities and other areas.

The map is now available through the Travel Information Section of the State Highway Division, Room 101, State Highway Building, Salem 97310, or at the Certified Information Centers operated by the various chambers of commerce throughout the state. The map is published as a public service by the State Highway Division to aid motorists in driving on state highways throughout the state. It is available free of charge at the addresses mentioned.
