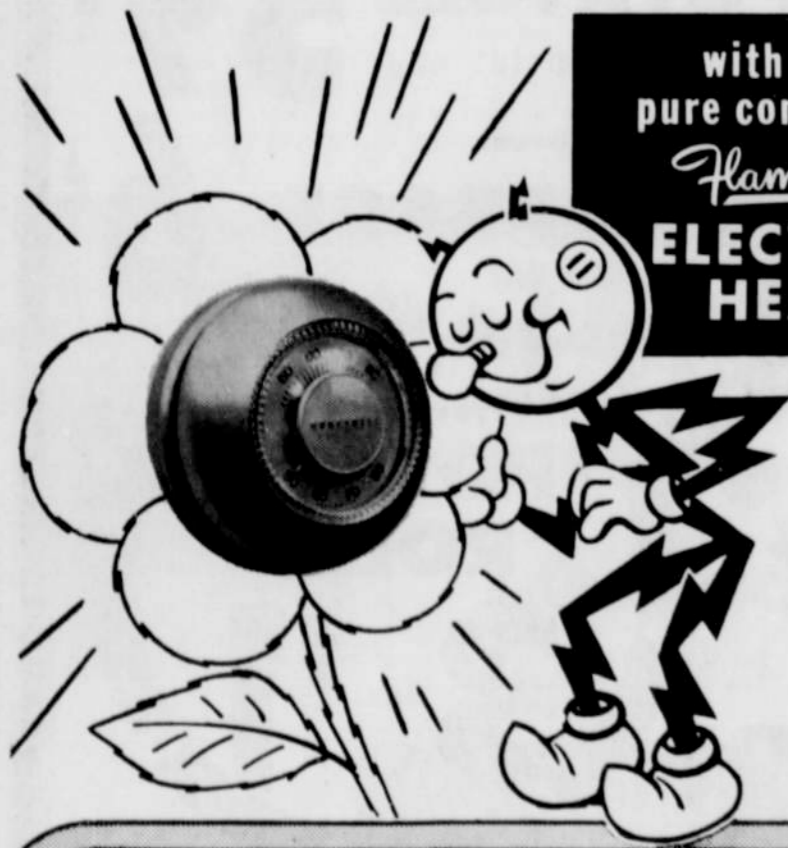

Packwood Survey Shows Oregonians Against Strikes

More than 7 out of 10 Oregonians responding to a questionnaire from Senator Bob Packwood do not believe either policemen or firemen should not be allowed to strike.

Nearly 40,000 questionnaires were returned to Packwood. It was a statewide, non-partisan survey.

Of those responding, 72.7% said firemen should not be allowed to strike and 72.2% said policemen should not be allowed to strike. Other categories of workers and public disapproval of their right to strike included:

sanitation, 66.2%; teachers 64.5%; railmen, 64.4%; airline, 58.5%; and, railroad, 58.3%.

On the question "Do you favor continued government funding of the SST?", 76.4% of those responding said "No" while 23.6% said they did.

More than 9 out of 10 persons participating in the survey want the seniority system used in Congress to either be abolished or modified. Only 3.2% did not have an opinion and only 4.7% want the seniority system continued in its present form.

By a small margin of 52% to 48%, participants said they believe "every American family is entitled to a minimum income."

But by a more comfortable margin, of 63.5% to 36.5%, persons responding said they believe "the government should guarantee adequate health care for every American citizen living in this country."

On the question of when the United States should restrict import and export quotas, only 12 per cent of the polled said "never"; 51.2% indicated there should be quotas when another nation prohibits American entry into their markets; 40.6%, when other nations offer goods at prices which make it necessary to protect American industry; 37.9%, when certain raw materials are in short supply in the United States. Only 8% indicated they were unsure.
