**Oregon Mobile Therapy Units Travel To Patients**

A mobile physical therapy program that started modestly in the more remote areas of eastern Oregon in 1959 has mushroomed into one of the busiest and most widespread services of the Easter Seal Society whose aim is "to meet the unmet needs of Oregon's physically handicapped," according to Robert F. Tarrant of Corvallis, society president.

Tarrant admits that society officials had their fingers crossed in 1959 when they embarked on an experimental program of sending a registered physical therapist into Oregon's remote areas to administer physical therapy as prescribed by the patient's physician.

"We knew there was -- and still is -- a shortage of registered physical therapists, particularly in the rural areas, but we weren't certain what the demand might be despite studies that showed there was a need," Tarrant stated. "But we certainly know now."
