WORK SMARTER - NOT HARDER

WORKING WIVES, MAYBE you need to practice a division of labor. Instead of tackling all the tasks on weekends, enlist help to do some every day. How you divide the work will depend on the family's living and work patterns. Clothes, for example, can be tossed in the washer any time, morning or night. (But be sure they're the type that can be washed-together.) Clean clothes can be folded and some clean-up jobs done during the week.

You might also do marketing during the week. Don't leave too much to do on Saturday. Remember, division of labor means planning for help from other family members, too.

THE NEWER FLOOR POLISHES are not really waxes but plastic in nature. Some homemakers tell us they are hard to remove.

Here's where the label comes in handy. You'll find directions for removal listed there. Most of them require the use of 1 to 2 cups ammonia with a gallon of warm water, plus 1/2 cup powdered floor cleaner to remove the polish. But, since they differ, the instructions on the container are your best guide.
