Nadine Spitze Reports On Peru Summer Activities

At the present time Peru is a land of warm sun with a magnificent Pacific Ocean beach where one may dip in the cool refreshing water and brown a little in the sun. The waves are large here in Peru and not the best for swimming but great for diving into and body surfing. The beach is a very important part of coastal life. With the help of an excellent transport system many families are able to spend their free Sundays basking in the warm sun.

Not everyone in Peru is close to a beach so the Peruvians use a method for cooling themselves during the summer months of January and February that they call Carnavales. This is a national project and occurs every Sunday in all parts of Peru with the young and the young at heart. The object is to get as much water as possible on the other person while keeping yourself as dry as possible. Of course, the game is supposed to be confined to Sundays and off the public streets. A second part of the project is to use talcum powder, flour, cornstarch or any other equally white substance to coat your victim. The project ends with a good shower and cleaning up of the water.

The Peruvians begin playing their national sport, football, known to North Americans as soccer when small and become

not only experts at moving the ball with their feet but with their heads as well. Young boys begin playing in parks and empty streets or lots. The beach is also a favorite place to play.

Here in Peru on the early morning cartoon show on television one finds the Flintstones and Johnny Quest but the words have been changed to Spanish. The movies for teenagers are along this same line. Every town has several theaters and the cost is 15¢ in smaller towns to 40¢ in Lima. The big first showing pictures in Lima cost a dollar. A majority of the shows are in English with Spanish words at the bottom. A few are in French and Spanish.

The stores close in the afternoon at 12:30 or 1 o'clock and open again from 4 until 8 p.m. One can browse in the specialty shops or in the small tourist shops where there are handmade Indian articles of pottery, gold, silver, woven articles and fur rugs. The tourist shops tend to be expensive but there are special markets to practice bargaining skills.

One of the special parks of Lima, Parque de Leyendas, is divided into three climatic regions of Peru, the jungle, mountains and coast. It is a quick biological tour of all of Peru as each area has plants and animals typical of that area.

A special activity in Peru is the fiesta with all kinds of typical food, drink and music for dancing. One rather different fiesta is called "El Arbol" or "The Tree" and is held in combination with the time of carnavales. This fiesta is a dance held around a tree. At the end of each dance the people who wish to, take a chop at the tree with a machete. The tree has small gifts in its branches and when it falls, the men rush to pick gifts for their families. The last person to chop on the tree then has the next fiesta of the Arbol.

In the evening there are dances of the family and friends, community dances on Saturday and Sunday, or dances at special clubs.

At the neighborhood fruit stand one will find large juicy grapes both green and purple, peaches, pears, apples or watermelon.

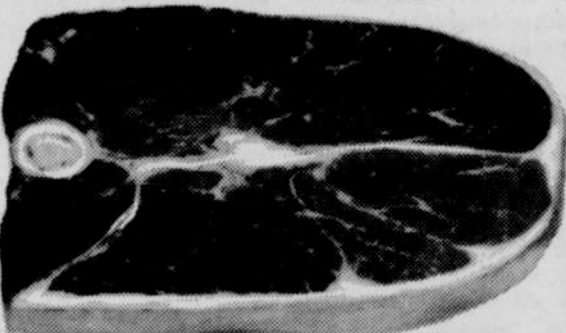
Foresters Help Pine Trees



Because their root nodules fix nitrogen in the soil, the bitterbrush plants in the foreground help speed the growth of the small pine trees. The beneficial brush plants become less dense as the trees grow up and develop a shade cover. Dr. C. T. Youngberg of Oregon State University is working on this project and others designed to produce better trees in fewer years.
