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STATE CAR USE PROMPTS ACTION BY GOVERNOR AND EDUCATION AUTHORITIES

House Speaker Robert F. Smith, R-Burns, said this week that the cost for the use, repair and cleaning of state-owned cars used in a parade in Nyssa in February will not be absorbed by Oregon taxpayers.

Smith, who asked Gov. Tom McCall to investigate the incident after receiving complaints from Nyssa residents, said that students from the University of Oregon will be required to pay the costs.

"This unfortunate incident was a clear-cut case of misuse and abuse of taxpayer-owned property," Smith said. "As such, those responsible should be required to pay. Taxpayers should not be expected to finance such irresponsible and destructive conduct."

Four state cars from the University of Oregon were used in the parade, the investigation disclosed. One car was wrecked and the others were returned in a very dirty condition, Smith said.

The concert will be conducted by Craig Northrup, band director; Gary Condon, choir director; and Bob Richardson, student teacher.

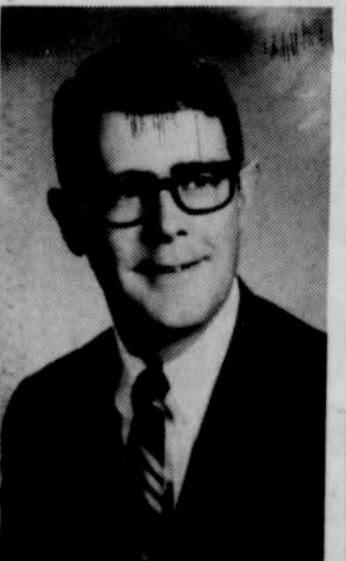
Adrian Soil And Water District Reelects Officers

One of the cars was returned 20 hours late, Smith said.

Students checking out the cars, Smith said, misrepresented to the University the reasons for use of the cars.

Smith said the Governor has called a meeting of the Chancellor of the State System of Higher Education and the presidents of Oregon's colleges and universities "to reassess their policies concerning the use of state cars by students."

He said it is the Governor's view that "state cars should be used only on official state business, and that transportation needs of the students can and should be met through the use of rental cars at student expense."

"There is absolutely no excuse for this type of disgusting occurrence," Smith said. "This incident was just one of a number of confirmed situations where misuse of state vehicles by students have been involved."

Smith said he had complained repeatedly to University officials in the past, and warned that the Legislature would be required to take forceful action "unless the responsible officials demonstrate a little more backbone."

"The laxity of administration in the issuance of state cars at the University of Oregon is a disgrace, and it must stop immediately," Smith said.

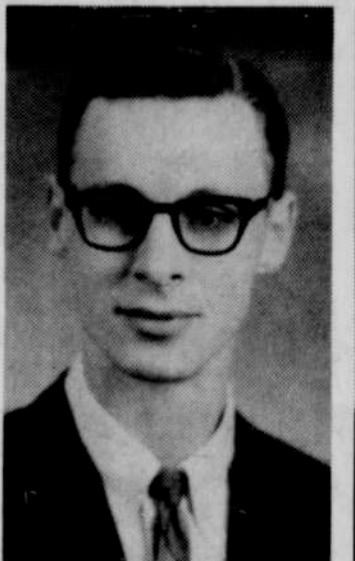
Those from Nyssa with 3.5 averages included James L. Anderson, John B. Pratt, Joann E. Timmerman and Denzel S. Weeks.

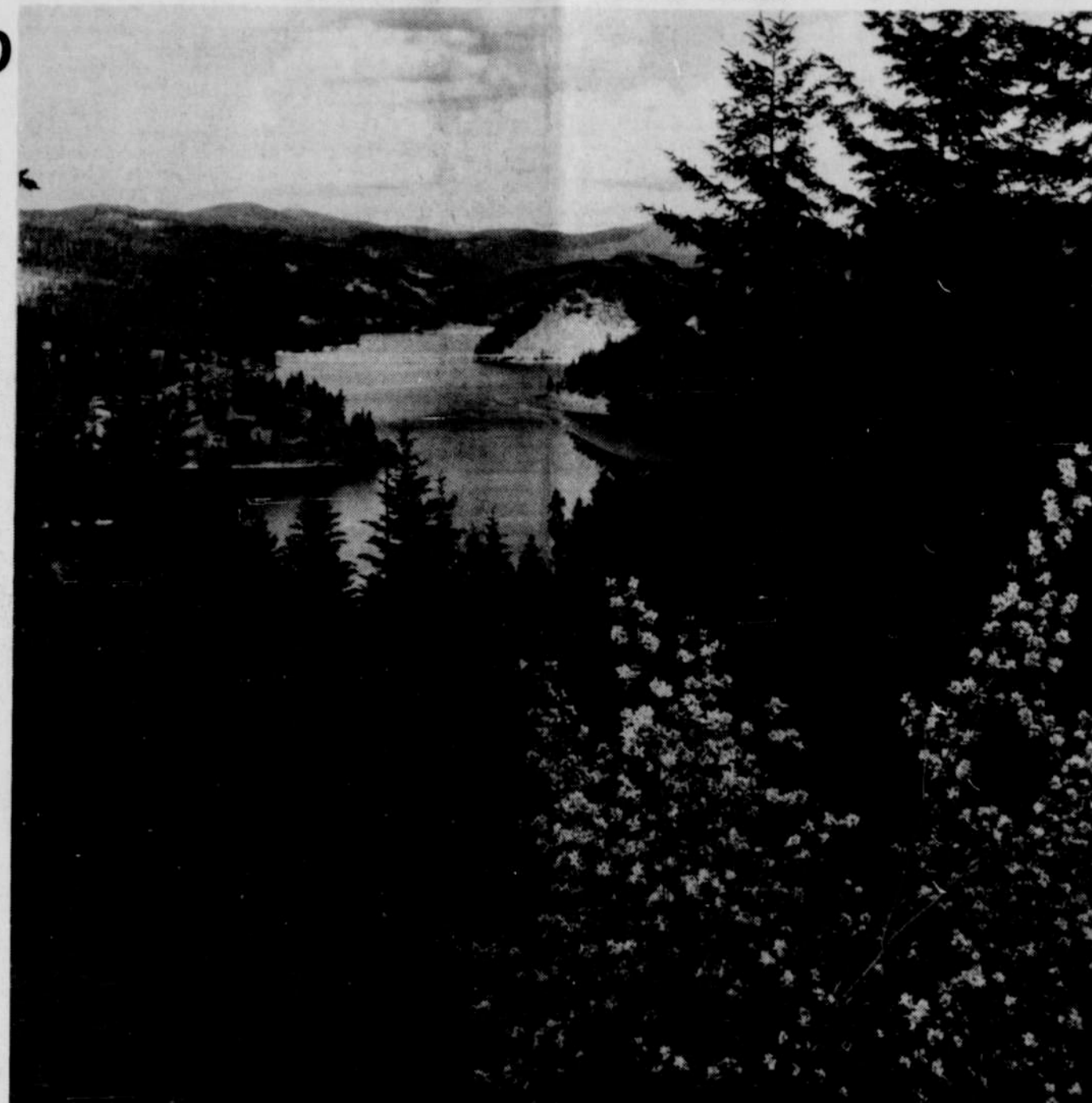

WOODROW SEUELL FILES FOR SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION

Superintendent W.L. McPartland announced that the nominating petition of Woodrow Seuell has been filed for Nyssa School District No. 26 director. He will oppose Gene Stunz, incumbent, at the school election May 3.

Friday, April 2, is the last date that a candidates petition may be filed, McPartland said, and it is also the last date that voters who are not registered may register for the school election.

The school Budget Hearing is set for Tuesday, April 6 at 8 p.m. in the Multi-purpose room of the Primary Building. Interested persons are invited to appear and discuss the proposed budget with the Budget Committee.

Amalgamated Growers Receive Early Payment

Sugarbeet growers for The Amalgamated Sugar Company of Ogden were mailed their interim crop payment about two weeks early this spring, totaling \$2,147,000 for the Treasure Valley region of southwestern Idaho and southeastern Oregon, Robert Van Horne, Nampa District manager, and Raymond Larson, Nyssa District Manager, reported.

The payment came early due to a strong sugar market and a beet purchase agreement which shares returns from sugar on an approximate 63%-37% split between the growers and the beet processor, Van Horne and Larson explained.

Traditionally, Treasure Valley sugarbeet growers receive their sugarbeet crop payment in three parts: an ap-

proximate 85 percent initial payment, based on the projected returns for refined sugar during the coming year; an interim spring payment, which brings the total received to approximately 90 percent of the anticipated total crop return; and a final payment made during harvest of the following season's crop, based on actual performance of the sugar market.

The managers noted that the net return for refined sugar to date has been higher than was anticipated at the time the initial payment for the 1970 crop was made. This week's "early" payment was made on the basis of the strengthened sugar market.

In a letter to Treasure Valley sugarbeet growers, the managers noted that growers are not restricted in their plantings for this coming season, as there will not be government acreage allotments for the 1971 crop year. They also observed that the sugarbeet industry is looking forward to much lower labor costs in the beet fields. They said that growers who take advantage of new mechanization techniques in growing their sugarbeet crops can achieve even higher yields and profits.

WSU Honors Nyssa Student

Dennis Wilson, a Washington State University junior from Nyssa, has been initiated into Upsilon chapter of Alpha Tau Alpha, national agricultural education honorary fraternity. The ceremony took place recently in WSU's Compton Union Building on the 20th anniversary of the fraternity's founding at WSU. Membership is limited to students who are majoring in agricultural education.

Wilson, a graduate of Nyssa High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Seburn, Rt. 2.

Ralph Lowe Takes Waterworks Course

A total of 167 waterworks operators from across Oregon --including Ralph Lowe of Nyssa-- completed a special three-day short school at Oregon State University March 22-24.

The school is sponsored annually as a service to cities, water districts, and water utility companies of the state.

Purposes of the school are to reduce hazards to public health and to promote efficient and economical operation of costly water supply systems. The Oregon State Board of Health cooperates in sponsoring the training with the OSU Department of Civil Engineering.

Basic and advanced programs are given for waterworks operators and purification plant operators.

FAREWELL BEND CONCESSION GIVEN TO NYSSA MEN

The Oregon State Highway Commission today approved the bid of Clarence Page, Jerold Page, and Dean Lauderback of Nyssa relative to the concession operation at Farewell Bend State Park.

The winning bid of 20.5 percent to the State of the first \$20,000 gross sales was much higher than the other bid of 12 percent of \$20,000 of gross sales, submitted by James and Frances Monroe.

The award will be made upon the receipt of a satisfactory performance bond.

This operation has been inactive for several years, and the reopening will provide an additional service for the public.

In other words - FIGHT CANCER WITH A CHECKUP AND A CHECK!

This advice is given by Mrs. J.L. Church, Nyssa chairman of the volunteer workers who will be calling on residents during April. Mrs. Church asks that "everyone please help, and above all do read the pamphlet

that the volunteer worker will leave with you." "Cancer's Warning Signals," which is the title of the pamphlet, are as follows:

1. Unusual bleeding or discharge;
2. A lump or thickening of the breast or elsewhere;
3. A sore that does not heal;
4. Change in bowel or bladder habits;
5. Hoarseness or cough;
6. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing;
7. Change in a wart or mole.

Nyssa Co-op Burglarized

One man was arrested early Monday morning allegedly in the process of burglarizing the Nyssa Co-op Supply at 18 North Second, according to the Nyssa Police Department.

Two others believed implicated in the crime were arrested later in Idaho. They were arrested at Parma, and identified as John Wier, 43, who refused to give an address, and Rita May Baker, 23, of Route 2 Parma.

Reeder Scott Hale Jr., 20, Vale, was arraigned before Nyssa Justice of the Peace E. Otis Smith later in the day on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling. Hale asked for a court appointed attorney and the arraignment is being continued in Nyssa Justice Court.

Hale is confined to the Malheur County Jail in lieu of \$2,000 bail.

Nyssa Police Chief Alvin Allen said Hale was apprehended outside of the Nyssa Co-op Supply by an Oregon state police officer. Some items from the building were alleged to be nearby.

Entry into the building was made through a window and employees of the firm have been attempting to determine how much merchandise has been removed from the building.

About \$1,500 in automotive supplies and tools were recovered after the other two persons were arrested at Parma, Chief Allen said.

Canyon County Sheriff Dale G. Haile said the Parma police were notified by Nyssa police at 3:50 a.m. that the cash register and many tools were reported taken from the co-op service station in Nyssa.
