Enroute home they stopped in Klamath Falls and visited another son Gary Wilson. They found he had just finished moving into a different apartment.

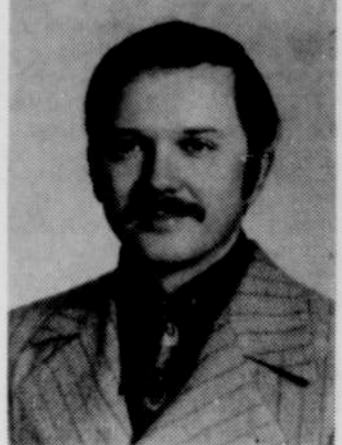
### William Russell Appointed Deputy District Attorney

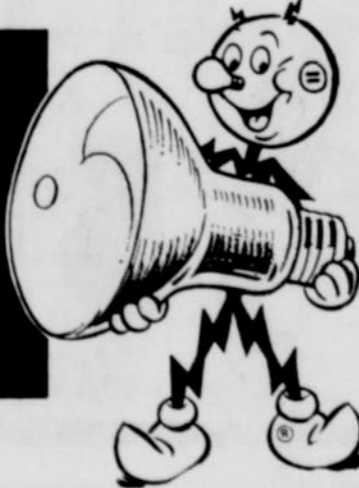
