40 YEARS AGO

A narrow canyon called the Hole-in-the-Ground, driven through rocks by the elements ages past, is being blocked by man for the storage of a lake of water for the Owyhee irrigation project. This blockage, the Owyhee Dam, under construction by the General Construction Co., has reached a height of about 65 feet above the level of the river. The dam is now about 60 per cent completed, according to Frank T. Morgan, secretary of the Owyhee District.

The dam is being built in panels to take care of the temperature and shrinkage of concrete. A track follows the rim of the cliff for transportation of materials. The spillway outlet marks the exit of a tunnel through almost solid rock for diversion of water from the reservoir.

Nyssa residents were surprised to see a light fall of snow Wednesday morning. It rapidly disappeared. The weather has been exceedingly cold but it is reported that there has been only slight damage to fruit.

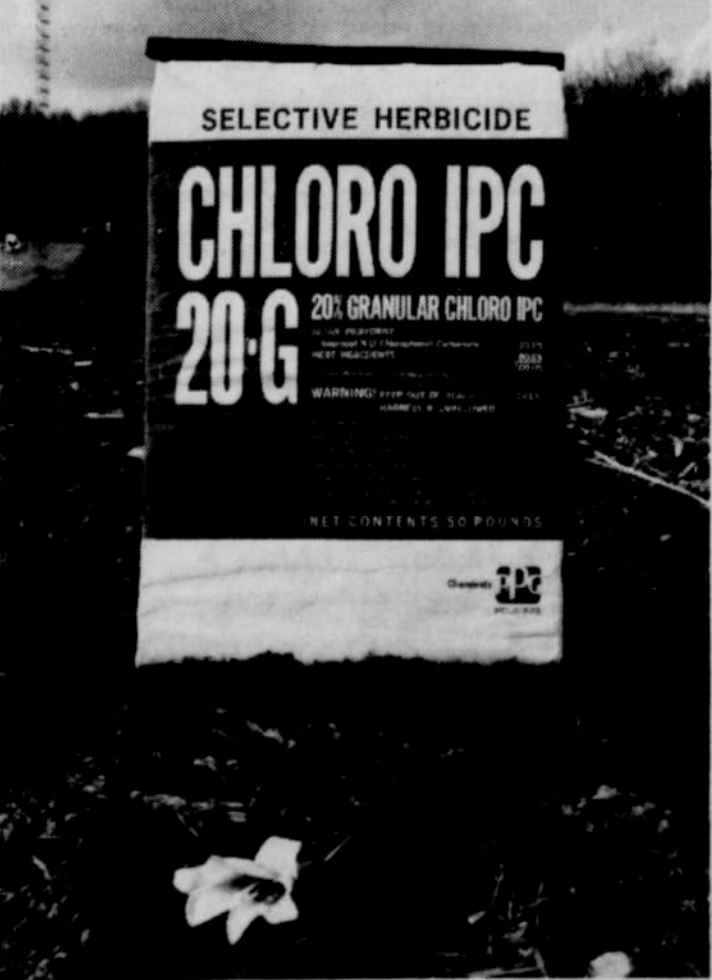
