He has gained national recognition for his establishment of Denver's famed Driver Improvement School -- a school for violators, principally, but attended also by volunteers who do not want to become violators.



Salem Scene

Harl Haas was named after a man they used to call "Mr. Republican" in southeastern Missouri.

Today he's hopping mad at the GOP.

He's also disillusioned, frustrated, disappointed and dog-tired.

This condition has no bearing on the namesake relationship with his maternal grandfather. It's part of his job. The 38-year-old Portland attorney is Minority Leader for House Democrats this 56th session of the State Legislature.

Along with the other 89 lawmakers in Salem, Harl Haas figures his first duty is enacting legislation in the best interests of the people of his state. But as Lower House leader of the party out of power, he has additional duties even more vexatious than the complicated law-making process.

In a nutshell, he's supposed to remain true to that first duty and at the same time discredit the majority that casts the most votes for or against all bills.

He welcomes this challenge as part of a life-long ambition to be politically active. Back in southeastern Missouri nearly everyone named Haas is a staunch Republican. They all exert an influence on young Harl. But another Missourian led him to the Democrat fold.

"Harry Truman was a maverick in the Morse tradition," he explains. "As a boy I watched him stump in my hometown of Cape Girardeau as a 48-year-old defeated county commissioner on his way to the U.S. Senate."

"A short while later as a fifth grader I skipped school to listen to him get nominated for vice president and figured right then I'd probably become a Democrat."

Only a second-session Legislator, Haas admits he brought a certain degree of naivety into his office last January. As a freshman in 1969 his ability was recognized by House Republicans and rewarded with satisfying committee assignments. He didn't exactly get his way about everything. But enough of his ideas were embraced to blunt the loneliness and futility that accompany most first-termers.

He also won a bride last session and the whole experience had an air of felicity.

Haas did get involved politically in 1969. He became a close friend of Senator Berkeley (Bud) Lent, a fellow Portland attorney on the rise to statewide party prominence. As a team they provided legislative leadership for Democrat fund-raising efforts.

Easily re-elected, Harl Haas returned to Salem -- and assumed minority leadership with alacrity. His friend Bud Lent was headed for the Senate presidency. Due in part to their efforts, the Democrats had gained significant ground du-

ring between-sessions elections.

As dedicated to the betterment of Oregon as he is to his party, Harl Haas came to Salem this year ready to join with his Republican friends of the session-past and negate the partisan aspect of his new role.

Four months into the session -- after weathering Lent's defeat by a new non-coalition and an attack on his favorite Democrat fund-raising event, he has emerged a minority leader in a manner the role demands.

He bitterly admits he's still smarting from the floor fight that may refer the 18-year-old vote to the '72 Primary. But in the midst of that battle, Harl Haas was tried. He was not found wanting.

In a gesture of sheer exasperation, the minority leader walked off the floor.

"I was scared. I didn't know what would happen. I told a couple of people nearby I was leaving and wanted them to follow. They passed the word -- three were instructed to stay and keep an eye on things. Everyone else came right out behind me," he said a few days later -- in a voice still slightly tinged with awe.

"It was beautiful. Sure, we lost the floor fight. But House Democrats have always been sort of mavericks. That day we were together and we're going to stay that way," this time in a tone laced with confidence, the awe completely gone.

The Minority Leader believes the Vote-18 issue can be used at the polls next year to enrich his party's ranks the same way Democrats used the sales tax proposal after last session.

As his position dictates, Haas must watch as the majority trumps the good things that happen. But he responds in the tradition of his predecessors and goes after every shred of credit public credulity will allow.

The Minority Leader is rolling. He was on his feet the other day defending Rep. Grace Peck in her tangle with Republican Fritz Chulnard. And he made his point over the protesting gavel of Speaker Robert Smith.

So he's disappointed and disillusioned and all those other things. There are still six or eight weeks of this session to go. He's thinking about his own political future as well as that of his party.

That grandfather's two given names were Harl Henry. And you get the idea Harl Haas is only half kidding when he tells you he's collecting all the old Hubert H. Humphrey buttons he can find.

And there's something else, too. That pretty bride of last session will present the Minority Leader with an heir next fall.

Agenda Set For PTA Convention

The convention will be climaxed Thursday evening with a banquet at the Sheraton Hotel, choral group concert and installation of officers.

ENLISTMENT FOR EUROPE OPEN

The United States Army has announced its popular European enlistment option is once again open, according to Sergeant Matthews Army recruiter, on Ontario, for this area.

Under the terms of the enlistment option, young men who have no previous military service may enlist for three, four, five or six-year periods. They will be trained in the Infantry, Armor or Artillery Career Groups before their European assignments.

The Army recruiter also noted that a limited number of applicants may be accepted for enlistment in the 3rd Armored Division, 4th Armored Division, 3rd Infantry Division (Mechanized), 8th Infantry Division (Mechanized), 2nd Armored Cavalry Regiment, 14th Armored Cavalry Regiment or 3rd Brigade, 1st Infantry Division (Mechanized). All are crack combat units of the United States Army, Europe.

After enlisting, the new soldier must complete basic combat training and advanced individual training, or the equivalent, before going on to his new assignment.

Once in Europe, he is guaranteed he will be with the United States Army, Europe, or with the unit for which he enlisted, for a total of sixteen months. At the end of that period, he will be eligible for a new assignment in accordance with the needs of the Army.

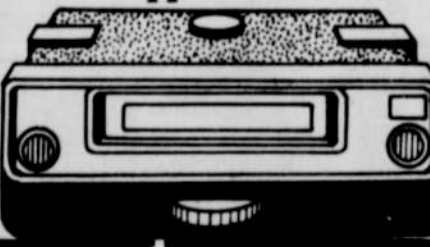
