Several boys will receive an all expense paid scholarship to attend the camp. A panel of judges will review applications and select those to receive the scholarships.

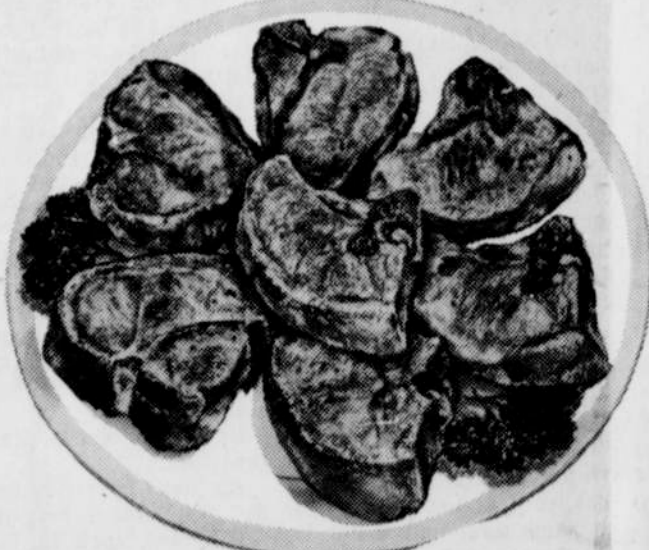
There will be a special "BASEBALL" tonight (Thursday, 22) at 8 p.m.
