**More Travel Trailers Used**

If you think the highways each spring and summer become crowded with campers and travel trailers -- most of them in front of you -- the Oregon Motor Vehicles Divisions says you have reason to think so.

In 1970, the Division licensed 85,483 campers, motor homes and travel trailers. Only 2,600 of them were classified as motor homes. The agency says the 1970 figure means that there is one recreational vehicle for approximately every 15 passenger cars licensed in the state.

This was the first year the agency provided a breakdown for recreational vehicles. It stemmed from changes in the registration law requiring such units to be licensed as a special class for the first time last year.

Fees collected on these units designated for acquisition and maintenance of state parks. In 1970, this amounted to \$90,447 from motor homes; \$356,185 from campers; and \$1,135,848 from travel trailers, for a total of \$1,582,480. Mobile home registration fees also go to this fund and, in 1970, this amounted to \$244,058.

Populous Multnomah county, as might be expected, had the highest number of recreational vehicles licensed, 15,742. It was followed by Lane county with 10,416. Other counties with 5,000 or more recreational vehicles were: Clackamas, 6,912; Washington, 5,284; Marion, 5,771; and Jackson, 5,019.

**A Tribute To Policemen**

A policeman is many things. He's a son, a brother, a father, an uncle, and sometimes even a grandfather. He is a protector in time of need and a comforter in time of sorrow. His job calls for him to be a diplomat, a psychologist, a lawyer, a friend, and an inspiration. He suffers from an overdose of publicity about brutality and dishonesty. He suffers far more from the notoriety produced by unfounded charges. Too often, acts of heroism go unnoticed and the truth is buried under all the criticism. The fact is that less than one-half of one per cent of policemen ever discredit their uniform. That's a better average than you'll find among clergymen.

A policeman is an ordinary guy who is called upon for extraordinary bravery -- for us! His job may sometimes seem routine, but the interruptions can be moments of stark terror. He's the man who faces a half-crazed gunman, who rescues a lost child, who challenges a mob, and who risks his neck more often than we realize. He deserves our respect and our profound thanks.

A policeman stands between the law abider and the law breaker. He's the prime reason your home hasn't been burned, your family abused, your business looted. Try to imagine what might happen if there were no policemen around. And then try to think of ways to make their job more rewarding. Show them the respect you really have; offer them a smile and a kind word; see that they don't have to be magicians to raise their families on less-than-adequate salaries.

We think policemen are great. We thank God for all the little boys who said they would be policemen, and who kept their promise. We hope you feel the same way, and we hope you'll show it -- so there will always be enough good policemen to go around.

**Range Improvements Planned For This Year**

Range operators in Malheur County again plan an extensive improvement program this year reports George Bain, County Extension Agent.

The projects include sagebrush control and range reseeding on nearly 20,000 acres. The Malheur County ASCS Committee is again providing cost share funds of 50% of the cost up to \$1,000 per operator according to Jim Christian, Office manager for the County ASCS Office in Ontario as soon as possible.

Past experiences have shown that sagebrush control doubles the amount of grass production on ranges having a good understory of grass. Reseeding provides a reliable source of feed on acres not previously producing their potential forage. Crested Wheatgrass is the grass most often selected by operators since it does well in our dryer climate. Reseeding sites should be those having deep soils with a clay content adequate to hold moisture. Bain said that in the past three years there have been approximately 45,000 acres of such range reseeded.
