Granny's RECIPES & RULES

Recipes and important rules of conduct from the cookbook of Great Grandmother Burger, published in 1800. Information received from Mrs. Dale Witt.

"HEATING THE OVEN" Those who burn wood have comparatively an easy task to get the oven just right. Its offener too hot than too cool. Use hard wood, let the fire burn clear until there is a heavy bed of coals before the damper is turned into the oven, then it can generally be regulated to suit the degree of heat wanted. If fuel is added, add by littles in order to keep the heat uniform as possible. If the oven is too hot, put the oven grate under the cake pan. If the top is too hot, put a pan of water or a pie pan of water on the grate above the cake. A draft from the open door window will often check the heat and interfere with the baking. Fruit cake and large loaf cake requires heat nearly to that of bread. When cake starts to brown cover with a smooth brown paper. News paper will burn easy. If coal is used the tendency is too great a heat, and due care is necessary to keep the fire under control. In baking eggs are as essential as good butter, a middling good egg is generally a bad one. There are eggs however which smell agreeable, that will not make frosting, but will heat up light and sweet in a cake batter. To beat the whites of eggs put in a pinch of salt. Salt cools and freshens them.

CREAM CAKE
1 egg - break in a cup, fill the cup with sour cream. Mix with 3/4 cup of sugar. Add 1 1/2 cups of flour, 1/2 teaspoon (scant) of soda, a pinch of salt, and 1/2 teaspoon extract. Beat well and bake in small loaf pan. Very nice also for patty pans. Cake's can be tested for doneness with a broom straw. If strow comes out dry cake is done.

QUICK FROSTING
Break the whites of 2 eggs in a bowl, do not beat, add a tablespoon of cornstarch, and pulverized sugar to make thick 1/2 teaspoon extract and 1/3 cup coconut. Mark the frosting on the cake when finished so it will cut easily when dry.

Work Smarter - Not Harder

HAVE TROUBLE GETTING children started doing their chores, getting washed up to come to the table or ready for bed? Maybe you tend to procrastinate yourself.

WHAT CAUSES POLYESTER core thread to knot and curl in hand sewing?
The polyester core stretches when pulled and snaps back when released, forming a curl. This thread also has static electricity generated by friction as the synthetic thread passes through

the fabric, particularly a synthetic fabric. The threadclings to itself, forming a twist which can turn into a knot.
