Engagement Announced

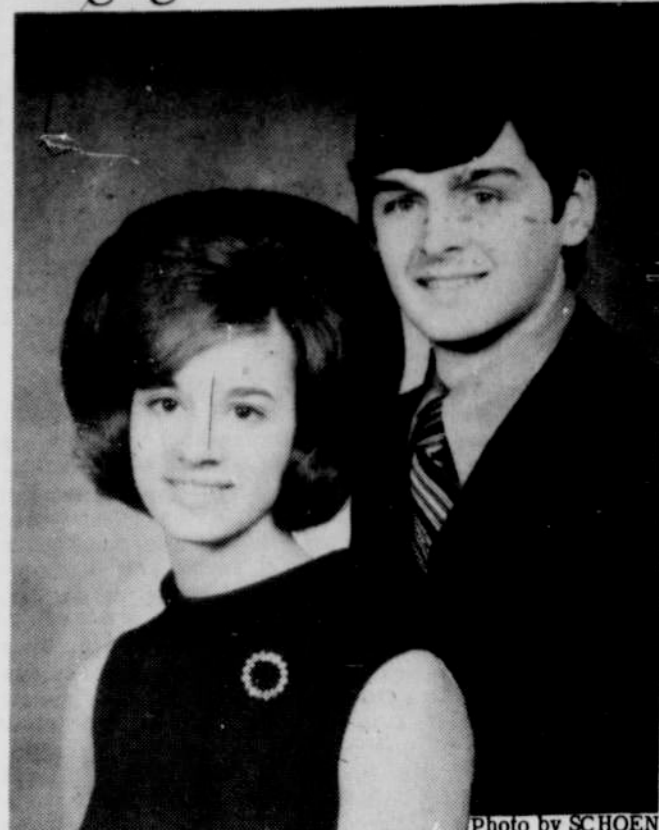
