Prices are something else. Perhaps this Idaho boy is way behind the times, but 85¢ for an ice cream soda was plenty and I grunted when I paid for storing my car, it was only \$4.75 per day. Idaho is beautiful in many ways.

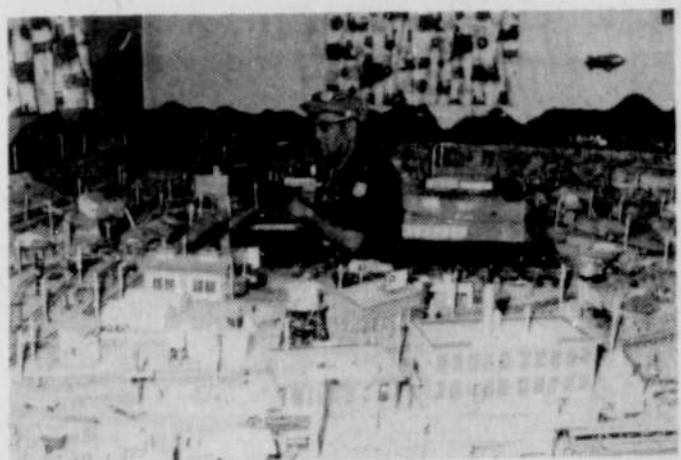

The Wilts, Bill and Betty, will host their annual spaghetti feed and model railroad gathering this week-end, April 24-25. They have 34 firm reservations and expect about 40 model railroaders from the three Northwest states.

Bill started this project in January, 1955, and has 3,110 hours and \$1,412.96 in the project, the fifth that he has built. Everything is to HO Scale, which means that all the equipment is 1 part to 87 actual size. A fascinating hobby, the Wilts attend conventions all over the country. Sandwiches have starred chopped and drained tomato at card parties ever since and 1 tablespoon each of England's Earl of Sandwich chopped onion, chopped green pepper and mustard. Make the spread for bologna triangles by combining 1/2 cup chopped bologna, 1/4 cup shredded Cheddar cheese, 2 tablespoons prepared mustard, 1 teaspoon quartered each and serving kabob-style. Each guest will enjoy the variety of a four-in-one sandwich.

Kabob Sandwiches Prepare 2 sandwiches with 2 whole wheat slices, arrange 2 "boiled" ham slices, 6 cucumber slices, cut 1/2 inch thick, and half a mixture of 1/4 cup mayonnaise and 1/4 teaspoon mustard. To prepare Braunschweiger sandwiches of 4 slices of white bread, combine 1/4 pound Braunschweiger, 2 tablespoons each of chopped celery and mayonnaise.

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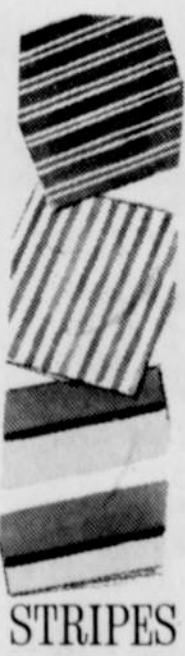
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
