### Air West Has New Flight

Effective Monday, Hughes Air West flight 622 will leave Seattle/Tacoma International Airport at 12 noon (PDT) and arrive in Ontario at 3:30 p.m. (MDT). The flight will make stops in Yakima, Pasco and Baker, with a connection in Pasco with a flight from Portland. The aircraft will be on the ground in Ontario until 5 p.m. at such time flight 429 will leave for Portland via Baker and Pasco, arriving in Portland at 6:25 p.m. Connections can be made in Pasco for Seattle or Eugene.

Regular one-way fares remain the same: Baker, \$17; Pasco, \$32; Yakima, \$36; Seattle/Tacoma and Portland, \$39; Eugene, \$42. Round-trip rates are double the one-way rates. The Airline will continue to operate 1 flight daily in-to and out-of Ontario except on Saturday and Sunday. The present type aircraft, Fairchild 27 Propjet, seats 40 passengers and has been renovated to handle more airfreight, will continue on the Ontario run.

We wish to thank the press for the fine effort which has been made to keep the public informed concerning the affairs of the OEO Migrant Education Programs in Malheur County. Much of the work that has been done in recent weeks is of the nature that it has been difficult to publicize. This work has involved meetings with Congressmen, telephone conferences with OEO officials, Governor McCall's office, and our representatives in Salem, as well as meetings of locally elected officials. We again want to thank all those who have worked so diligently toward the goal that any OEO programs in our area be locally controlled through democratic processes.

To date, many people have volunteered to help and have stated, "Please let us know what we can do to help." WE NOW NEED HELP, in two respects.

First, we need money to help pay the expenses of Juan Vargas, Roy Uranga and Wilton Jackson, for their trip to Washington, D.C. They will be paying much of the expense from their own money, but we should bear the financial burden. Please send your check now to either of us, payable to "United Americans."

Second, please write letters to your Congressional Representatives telling them:

- 1. The Utah Migrant Council should not be allowed to sponsor programs or spend government funds in this area; and
- 2. The funds should be made available to a local program sponsored by either the local Migrant Education Advisory Boards or the Malheur County Court.

Many probably have never written a letter to Washington. We suggest that you don't need to worry about the form—long hand is fine—and just write it in your own words, like you would to any friends. If we don't move now and effectively block the Utah Migrant Council, our troubles may just be beginning. So, we ask you to act right now, since your future depends upon it.
