

Rear Admiral Edwin M. Rosenberg, USN



Rear Admiral Edwin M. Rosenberg, USN, Commander Naval Reserve Training, will head a 21-man inspection party that will visit Naval Reserve units in Boise Monday, May 3. In addition the admiral and his staff will visit units in Salem, Oregon and Tacoma, Bremerton, and Seattle, Washington.

As commander Naval Reserve Training, Admiral Rosenberg is responsible for the training and readiness of more than 100,000 Naval Reservists throughout the United States. They train at more than 360 Naval Reserve training centers across the country, as well as aboard more than 60 Naval Reserve training ships located on the East, West and Gulf Coasts.

The Naval Reserve Training Command is a nationwide command established in 1956. The command headquarters is located in Omaha, Nebraska, on a former Army post, Fort Omaha, which was established in 1868.

Rear Admiral Rosenberg was born in Moscow, Idaho, and entered the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, in 1938, and was commissioned Ensign in 1941. He was promoted to his present rank of Rear Admiral on July 1, 1969.

First assignment for the newly commissioned Ensign Rosenberg was aboard the cruiser USS OMAHA (CL-4) where he saw action in the South Pacific. In 1944 he attended flight training, and then served in patrol squadrons. He later went back to sea as navigator aboard the USS RUDYERD BAY (CVE-81).

In 1950 he was assigned as Executive Officer of the USS VOGELGESANG (DD-862), and later commanded the USS BLACKWOOD (DE-219) and the USS GURKE (DD-783). In 1963 he assumed command of the Pacific Fleet Destroyer Division 232, and later became Assistant Chief of Staff for Operations and Readiness on the staff of Commander First Fleet.

In June 1966 Admiral Rosenberg assumed command of the guided missile cruiser USS CANBERRA (CAG-2). CANBERRA was the major gunfire support ship for the Seventh Fleet from October 1966 through May 1967. In his additional duty as Commander Task Group 77.1, Admiral Rosenberg commanded the Sea Dragon Task Group off North Vietnam. His last tour of sea duty was as Commander Amphibious Group Three from December 1968 to June 1970. Rear Admiral Rosenberg became Commander Naval Reserve Training in June, 1970.

A native of Idaho, Admiral Rosenberg will be welcomed back home by Naval Reserve members of Boise's Surface Division 13-1. Nyssa officers and men attached to the division are Captain Gene Stutz, LCDR William Gillam, CWO Dirick Nedry and SF2c Ed Lawrence. LTJG Wayne McConnell of Ontario is also a member of the division, which includes men from Weiser, Payette, and as far east as Twin Falls, and as far north as McCall.

"Just as beef is more nutritious and has fewer calories than is generally known, so it is that women pass up the budget cuts of meat, not knowing that when properly cooked they are equally delicious as the most expensive cuts," she says.

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OREGON RESIDENTS
GRANTS AVAILABLE

More than \$60,000 in federal funds is available in grants to provide residents of Oregon with opportunities for informal education in the humanities.

"The funds are for projects in Oregon which will assist the general public in understanding contemporary issues and problems by drawing upon history, philosophy, literature, and the other humanities," according to Dr. Thomas Vaughan, Director of the Oregon Historical Society and program chairman.

The money is part of a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, a federal agency created in 1965 by Congress, and is available to individuals and public or nonprofit groups or institutions in Oregon on a matching basis. The Oregon funds are administered by the Joint Committee for the Humanities in Oregon of which Dr. Vaughan is chairman.

"The Joint Committee will consider proposals which emphasize informal public programs such as public discussion sessions, lectures, and films, as opposed to formal academic coursework. Of particular interest to the Joint Committee are projects developed under the broad theme of Man and the Land," Vaughan commented.

This theme encourages project planners to apply the knowledge of the humanities to man and his relationship to the land; that is, what he derives from the land to meet his physical and spiritual needs, as well as what he returns or fails to return to the land to assure that it will continue to meet his needs," Vaughan added.

Grants will range between \$300 and \$5,000 and may be used to defray all major costs of projects. Matching requirements may be a combination of funds and "in-kind services." All projects must be completed by February 1, 1972, and must be conducted in Oregon.

Applications for funds are being accepted now with a deadline for all proposals to be submitted no later than October 1, 1971. Application forms and additional information may be obtained from John H. Steinhart, Project Coordinator, Division of Continuing Education, Extension Hall Annex, Corvallis 97331.
