10 YEARS AGO

40 YEARS AGO

Tunnels deep in the earth join the Owyhee canals. To miner or mucker, it is his job. To visitor, it is the thrill of a lifetime to ride into the cavernous depths of the earth, a thrill that inspires both trepidation and awe. Transportation is a flat little car that is pushed ahead by the "dinky," a small gas engine. The air is heavy and dusky with smoke or vapors in sections. Electric lights dimly flicker and seem inadequate in the hollows of the earth. Twelve inch timbers apparently support a mountain.

Under a maximum coverage of about 600 feet, J.F. Shea Co. of Portland is tunneling through almost solid rock. He is excavating tunnel # 1 to meet the Magoffin tunnel at a 2-mile point in the depths of the earth. A few yards from the outlet of tunnel # 1 is tunnel # 5, which will divert water to the Gem District. No. 1 is in 4298 feet; No. 5, 8433 feet. T.E. Connelly Co. San Francisco is building the upper-end of Tunnel # 5.

Is it possible that the tunnels will meet underground? Government engineers say yes. The responsibility rests on them. "Cherry picking" is no novelty in the tunnels. A hoist that lifts the small muck cars from tract to switch is called the "cherry picker." It makes one track for the cars sufficient.

The mucker is a small shovel that not only lifts the muck from the tunnel path but automatically loads it on the cars.

A huge pipe over a foot in diameter brings air into the tunnel that is supplied by the compressor. In reverse, it draws dynamite smoke and other fumes from the tunnel.

Less dangerous is the modern methods of dynamiting, explained Martin Boss, superintendent for the company. Electric exploders, of different lengths, are placed in the holes, 40 loads are attached by electric wires to one switch. One turn and the 40 blasts are off, two seconds apart.

A mile of railroad joining the General Construction Co. line runs to Tunnel Canyon. The Shea Camp is pitched on two hills, a high foot-bridge spanning the gulch between a dozen bunkhouses and the cookhouse. The camp is very modern and convenient. In the cookhouse is a huge frigidaire.

No trees or lawn beautify Tunnel Canyon but color greets the eye everywhere. Rimrocks, in all shades of crimson, clay and sand in brown, white and a peculiar green cover the slopes.

50 YEARS AGO

The work of installing Nyssa's new water system is proceeding rapidly, not withstanding some bad ground which has been encountered in excavating for pipe lines. Councilmen are on the alert to hurry the work and Mayor P.M. Warren this week donned his denims and got on the heavy end of a Fresno to insure the flow of water by May 15. The Wilson ditch was dammed near the C.P. Lackey residence and fills across the channel to accommodate pipe lines are being made. Some pipe has already been laid and everything indicates that the city will win the race to have the system completed by the time water is needed for lawns and gardens.

60 YEARS AGO
