U.S. Army Recruiters To Gain New Assistants

The United States Army Recruiting Command will inaugurate a new system of personalized recruiting across the nation this month. Called the Hometown Recruiter Assistant Plan, it will team young soldiers with experienced Army recruiters to tell their communities about Army career opportunities.

The Assistant Recruiters are being chosen from volunteers who are recent graduates of one of the Army's advanced individual training centers. The centers are located at Ft. Knox, Kentucky, Ft. Jackson, South Carolina, Ft. Polk, Louisiana, ficials reason that many young Ft. Lewis, Washington, and Ft. Ord, California.

Those eligible will be recent

ing and attitudes. They will also have been required to graduate in the top half of their classes at the centers. All will be members of the Regular Army and trained in infantry or armor.
