Sixth Graders Study Ecology



Enthusiastic 6th graders from Nyssa, Adrian, Vale and Ontario schools took part in the Outdoor Education Tour. The tour was planned by the BLM and the Extension service.

Lytle Boulevard and the Owyhee River were the two sites for this year's tour.

At the Soils and Geology station, Burrell Lovell showed a

relationship between the type of rocks found in Malheur County and the history of the area. Lovell then demonstrated some soil testing procedures.

At the Owyhee site in the Outdoor Manners station, Rob Currier talked about litter and pollution. He told what the results could be and how each could help prevent it. Currier also expressed outdoor courtesy.

Cliff Hamilton at the Wildlife station explained the necessary factors for wildlife to survive. Hamilton also demonstrated how they used radios that are attached to animals. Examples of the variety of

fish in Malheur County were seen at the Fisheries station. Ralph Elle also told of problems with fish and how his department was trying to solve them.

At the Lytle Boulevard site Al Logosz explained what Range Management was, what plants need to exist, and their benefits. Logosz pointed out several types of plants at the site that were commonly found on the range.

Max Olson and Bob Evans at the Fire Control station, showed fire fighting equipment and described the use of each. The students were bussed to the sites. Each session lasted approximately 20 minutes.

Participating in the project are the Oregon Game Commission, Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service and the BLM.
