BLM Asks For Pipeline Bids

Bids are being solicited for pipeline and watering trough installations for two springs in the Westfall unit of the Vale district, Bureau of Land Management District Manager T. Lieurance announced this week. The Bull Spring pipeline project will consist of approximately six miles of pipeline plus the installation of three sumps and nine 3000-gallon watering troughs. The pipeline will lead from a spring fed circular storage pit which will provide water for livestock in a large reseeded pasture. It is located about six miles northeast of Westfall. Pipeline installation from the Chicken Creek storage pit which is filled from the overflow of

Midland reservoir will total about five and one-half miles and will include three sumps and six 3000-gallon watering troughs. This project is located about four miles west of Harper and will water the Chicken Creek seeding. The tour of the project sites for interested bidders will leave from the Vale District Office at 8 a.m. Tuesday, May 25. Bids, which will be accepted from small business concerns only, will be opened at 2 p.m. PDT on June 8, 1971, at the BLM's Portland Service Center. Award of the contract (s) will not be made until July 1 of this year Lieurance said.
