### Sen. Packwood Seeks Academy Applicants

Senator Bob Packwood (R-Ore.) today announced he is accepting applications to Annapolis, West Point, Air Force and Merchant Marine academies for classes entering in July, 1972. Deadline for applying is November 30, 1971.

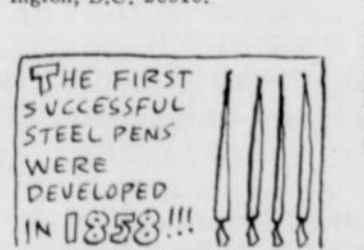
To be eligible, applicants must be between the ages of 17 and 21 and have completed high school by July 1, 1972.

Nominees are chosen on a strictly competitive basis. Those interested in attending one of the four service academies should write to Packwood as soon as possible to obtain the necessary application forms. Packwood selects the 10 highest-ranking applicants and nominates them to the academies of their choice. Appointment, however, is made by the Academy.

In January, the Senator will nominate candidates for appointment to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md., the U.S. Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs, Colo., and the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, N.Y.

### USDA Names Potato Board

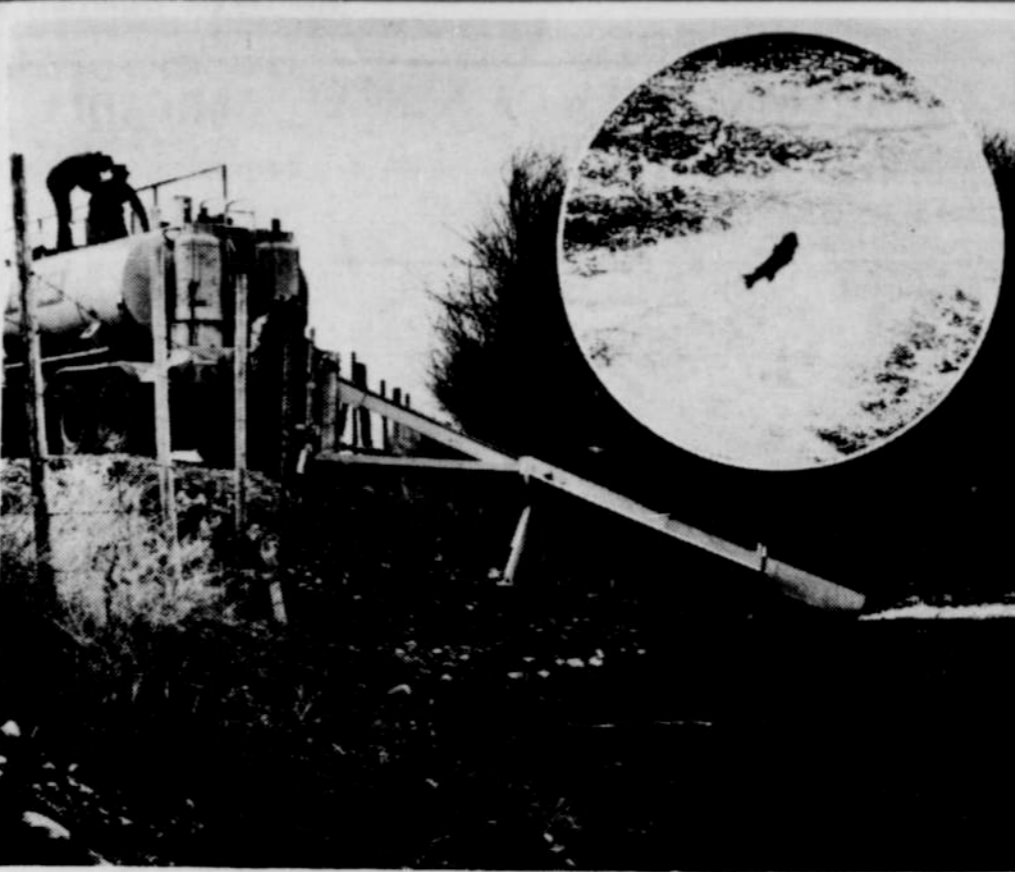
The United States Department of Agriculture has named new members and alternates to the Idaho-Eastern Oregon Potato Committee, which administers the Federal marketing order for potatoes grown in Idaho and Malheur County.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service said one of the main functions of the Committee is to recommend to USDA the grades, sizes, and qualities of potatoes which should be shipped from the production area.

An ambitious moving chore that might have taxed even heavens-holding Atlas has been completed by Idaho Power Company. Rolling across desert and over snow-bound mountains seven days weekly for two months, a specially equipped tank truck the utility operates moved more than 1.6 million steelhead fingerlings (total weight: 200,000 pounds) the 225 miles from its Niagara Springs hatchery to the Pahsimeroi River near Ellis. There the 8-inch, sea-going juveniles were released by chute into the Pahsimeroi--as seen here, with one shown close-up in the inset photo--to begin their three-year cycle

of migration to the Pacific. The hatchery-to-river haul is part of Idaho Power's broad conservation program aimed at transferring Hells Canyon-run steelhead and salmon to the Salmon River watershed and beef up its available resource for sportsmen. In the reverse phase of the steelhead transfer, reports Wendell Smith, Idaho Power fish biologist-environmental affairs director, some 700 adults returned to the company's Pahsimeroi hatchery this year. That's a 200-fish increase over the 1970 return to the hatchery, operated for the utility by the Idaho Fish and Game Department.
