Baccalaureate-Commencement exercises were held Sunday evening, May 23, at Adrian High School, with 32 seniors receiving their diplomas.

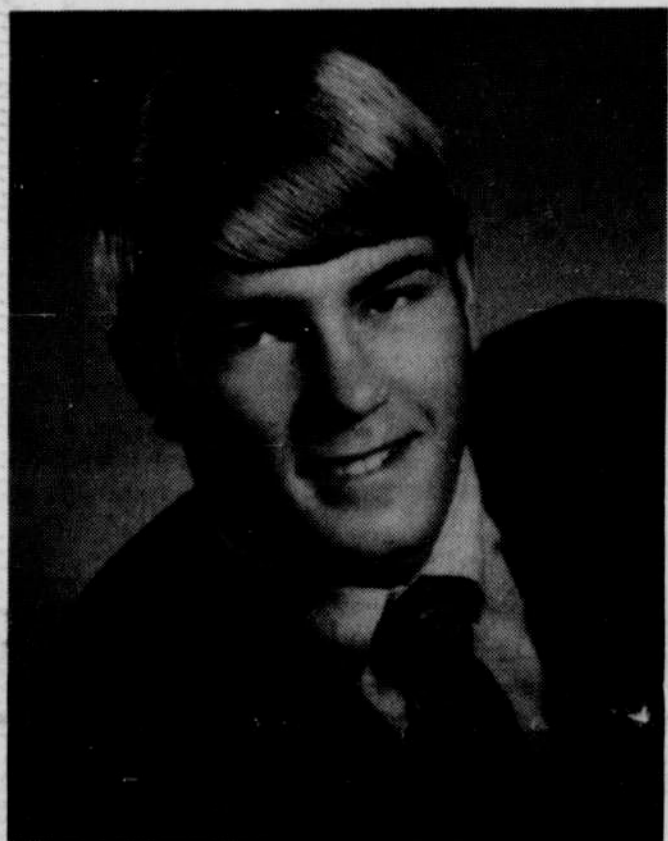

Savings Bonds Sales Continue To Rise

Savings Bonds sales in Oregon during the month of April rose to \$4,005,177 compared to \$2,515,680 for April of last year, or an increase of 59 percent, County Chairman Jim Leslie announced here today. January through April sales of \$14,212,034 represent an increase of \$3,277,460, or 30 percent, over the 1970 total of \$10,934,574, and accounts for 44 percent of Oregon's \$32.2 million 1971 "Take Stock in America" campaign goal, he said.

April sales in this county of

\$16,679 pushed the total sales for this year up to \$3,671,000, which is 51% of its 1971 goal, he continued.

National sales are also on the upward climb, amounting to \$463 million for the month as compared with \$366 a year ago, or an increase of 27 percent, the county chairman stated.

"The month of May celebrates the 30th Anniversary of the Savings Bonds Program. Since May 1 of 1941 Oregonians have purchased close to \$1.5 billion worth of Series E and H Savings Bonds," he concluded.

Memorial Day



The American Legion Post No. 79 will pay tribute, with military honors to the war dead Monday, May 31 at 11 a.m. at the Nyssa Cemetery.

Services will consist of an address by the Rev. Charles R. Young, a salute by the National Guard firing squad and taps by bugler, David Manley. Color bearers will be under direction of the Nyssa Post. Following the services, Memorial rites will be held at the Snake River bridge, where a wreath upon each grave in commemoration of Navy veterans.

The Memorial will begin Sunday evening when Legionnaires will place flags on the graves of every known war veteran. The American Legion Auxiliary will place a wreath upon each grave as well as the Memorial marker for the unknown soldier.

Monday at sunrise the National flag will be placed at half staff to show that the entire nation mourns its dead. At noon the flag will be returned to full staff, signifying new hope for the future and for the living. This same procedure will take place in U.S. Military Cemeteries in foreign countries as well as in all cemeteries in the United States.

PROPOSED NYSSA SCHOOL BUDGET REDUCED \$16,047 ELECTION SET JUNE 14

The Nyssa School Budget Committee met Friday evening, May 21, to discuss the proposed 1971-72 budget, and as a result of their deliberations the budget was cut \$16,047 in teacher salaries for next year. The budget as first proposed and voted on May 17 was defeated by 40 votes.

School Board Chairman Victor Haburchak said that most adverse comment heard after the first budget defeat was about salaries, and the board brought these down in line with the pattern set by all state agencies in Oregon, which is in the neighborhood of a 4% increase. Haburchak said that we are under, but near comparable salaries in Malheur County schools.

Budget Committee Chairman John Studer said that this budget is supported by the entire committee, and feels that it will now receive the support of school district patrons. The group set Monday, June 14 as the date of the election.

Superintendent W.L. McPartland said that no changes were

made in the budget for supplies, building repairs, and planned projects. He said that help will be available this summer through N.Y.C. funds to employ several young people from low income families to build bleachers, help on repairs and custodial work, and other construction projects.

Some additional lighting will be installed in the primary building to replace the light which was eliminated by the new solid roof installed last summer in place of the plastic roof which had deteriorated. The new roof has also eliminated some of the heat build-up that the skylight roof caused in this building.

The superintendent said that the foundation repairs planned for the elementary school are also in the budget. Also included is money for a new school bus, and repairs and maintenance on the roofs, so the district is not falling behind in these areas.

Carlyle Dean, Director of Athletics and biology instructor at Treasure Valley Community College, has submitted his resignation, according to Ed Haynes, Dean of Instruction. Dean, a member of the original faculty, came to the college in 1962 as a biology instructor. He was asked to form a basketball team and from that modest start developed a comprehensive intramural and athletic program. Judicious and excellent hiring of talented young coaches made it possible for TVCC to maintain an outstanding position in the Oregon Community College system as well as to gain national recognition in football and baseball, where TVCC lost only to the national champions in the regional.

Dean has served as Regional Director, Region 18, of the National Junior College Athletic Association; Chairman of the Oregon Community College Athletic Association; and on campus, Chairman of the Science Department. Dean Haynes said, "Carlyle Dean has contributed so much to this college, academically and athletically, that his loss will be severe. His hard work and deep devotion to the college and its programs will be exceedingly difficult to replace." President Emery Skinner said, "We shall deeply miss Carlyle, his lovely wife Jeanette, his daughter Pam who is a freshman at TVCC, and his son Bob, who is sophomore at Ontario High School."
