**Traffic Volume Shows Increase**

Traffic volume on most Oregon's highways showed an increase in March, 1971, compared to March, 1970 according to the monthly report compiled by the Oregon State Highway Division.

A summary of the permanent traffic recorder data for rural and urban state highways showed an increase of 2.1 percent in vehicular traffic in March, 1971, compared to March of 1970.

The first three months of 1971 showed an increase of 3.7 percent in vehicular traffic compared to the first three months of 1970.

**ORE-IDA FOODS INSTALL DEVICE TO IMPROVE AIR**

This summer Ore-Ida Foods, Inc. is doing something positive to improve the air we all breathe. The company plans to install "controlled atmosphere" incinerators at their Ontario, Burley and Greenville factories prior to fall startup. These incinerators are fired with natural gas to promote combustion and are designed to completely consume about a thousand pounds of combustible factory waste materials per hour. While consuming materials that were formerly destroyed by open burning methods, the units can be controlled to avoid release of smoke, odor, and ash particles into the atmosphere. Material is loaded into a ram feed chamber which automatically charges the incinerator.

The units are manufactured by WASTECO INC. of Tualatin, Oregon, and the installations are valued at about \$35,000 each. The three Ore-Ida incinerator units are of a new design and will be some of the first in the country. They will provide a positive method of reducing air pollution and when installed, they will put Ore-Ida in the position of being one of the first industries in Idaho to comply with current state and federal open burning regulations.

Ore-Ida has also installed a new "water scrubber" system on the main fryer smokestacks at the Burley factory. This unit has been developed to remove the cooking oil particles that have been mitted into the atmosphere from the french fryers. This same smokestack "water scrubber" system has also been scheduled for installation at all other Ore-Ida factories.

**ACCOUNTING TEST GIVEN BY TVCC**

A measure of comprehension accounting principles and procedures will be made possible at Treasure Valley Community College on Wednesday, May 26 from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. the test to be administered is a Level I Achievement Test prepared and graded by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Persons taking the test will receive a national percentile rating which may be used for reference for employment or advanced schooling, according to Richard Grigg, instructor in the college's business department and coordinator for this community service project.

College students completing their first full year of accounting will not be assessed an examination fee, however, anyone from the public may take the exam for a \$1.00 fee.

**ALFALFA WEEVILS DAMAGE HAY**

Alfalfa weevils are doing considerable damage to a number of hay fields in Malheur County according to County Extension Agent Leeds Bailey.

The small larvae of the weevil feed on the leaves of the alfalfa and are particularly damaging to the growing tips of the plants. Fields experiencing heavy damage from the pests will show numerous holes in the leaves and will have a gray color due to the action of the small worms feeding on the leaves.

Bailey had two suggestions as to how to handle the infestations.

If damage is noticeable one week or more prior to estimated cutting time, and more than 10 larvae per sweep are collected in the insect net, the field should be treated with an insecticide.

If heavy weevil damage is present and the crop is cut for hay without treatment, the operator may want to treat the stubble following the haying operation to keep the larvae from holding back the second crop.

The county agent says that several insecticides are effective in controlling the pest. He suggests that farmers follow the label on the insecticide to be sure and avoid a residue problem.
