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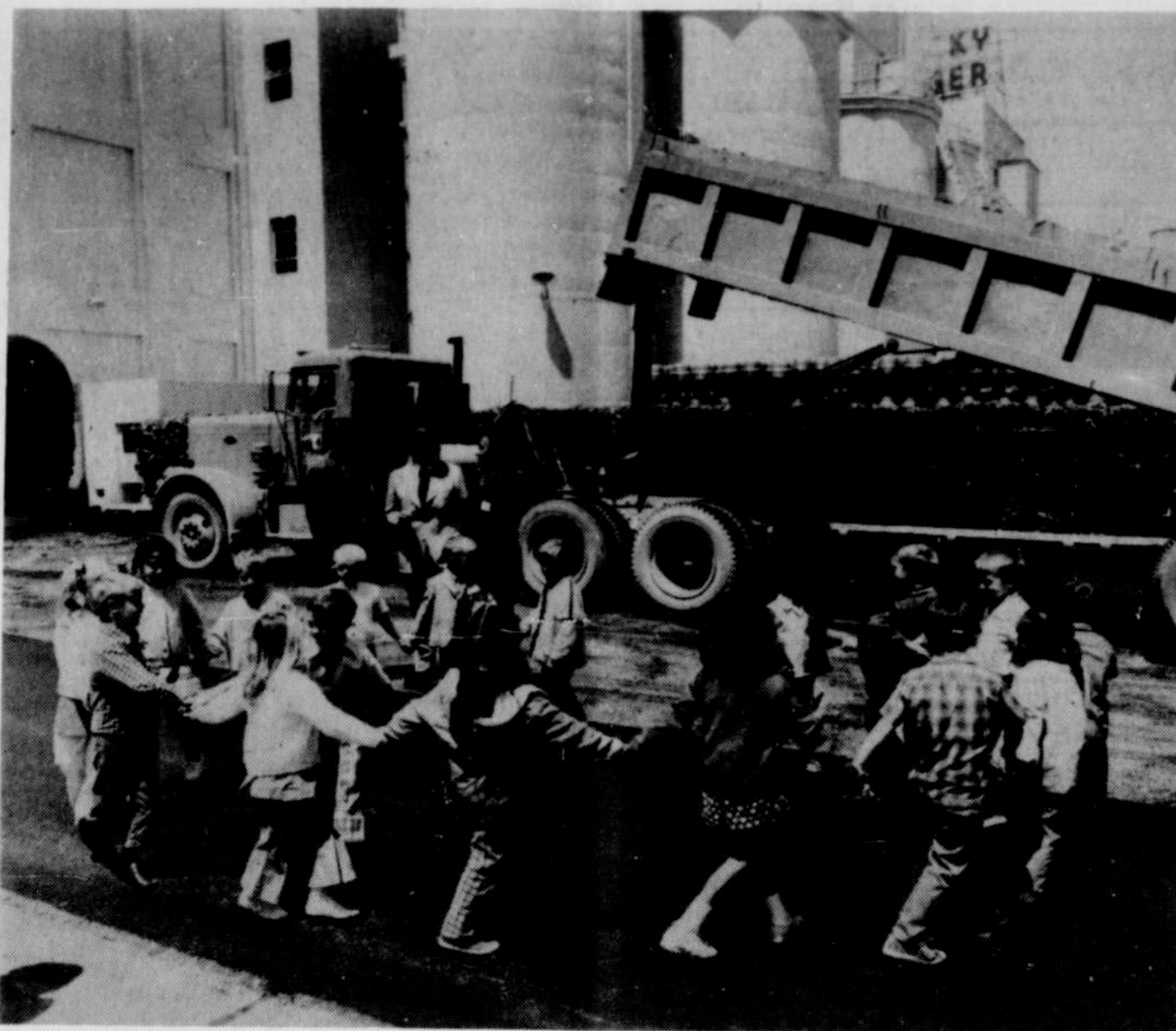

NYSSA WOMEN ATTEND WORKSHOP

Three Nyssa women and a Meridian, Idaho, woman attended a Gerontology Workshop in Pendleton May 17 to study the physiological and psychological problems of the aged.

From Nyssa were Teresa Bingham, Edna Blaylock and Amalia Usenko, home health aide from the Malheur County Health Department. Marie Crisp of Meridian also attended.

The one-day workshop was sponsored by the Division of Continuing Education, the University of Oregon School of Nursing and the State Board of Health, Chronic Disease Section. Similar workshops are scheduled in Portland, Salem, Eugene and Medford.

The course is a result of the increased demand for more and better nursing care for the elderly. This demand is being met by the development of geriatric nursing as a specialty and by research in gerontology.

Content covered the behavioral problems associated with aging, staff attitudes toward the aged person, confusion, loneliness, depression and the implications of nursing home placement. Dietary life styles of the patient and the institution were analyzed.

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
