# **COUNTY COURT APPLYS** FOR FEDERAL FUNDS TO **BUILD RECREATION SITES**

Members of the Malheur County Court last week applied for \$5,200 in land and water conservation department funds for certain recreation improvements in the county.

County Judge Ellis White said today this is a federal grant, in effect, but it goes through state agencies. The improvements will incl-

ude installation of a new boat ramp at Bully Creek and repair of the old facility and construction of two new ramps at Malheur Reservoir.
