They then purchased a farm east of Nampa on Airport Road in 1949, and in 1954 they moved into Nampa where they have since resided. He had been employed by the Western Idaho Production Credit Association at Caldwell for a number of years, and was with the organization at the time of his death.

He was a lifetime member of the Nazarene Church and had been a member of the North Nampa Nazarene Church since 1949, serving on the board and as head usher. He also served on the board of Nampa Christian High School.
