COLUMBIA RIVER STUDY PLANNED

Congressman Al Ullman said today the Corps of Engineers have informed him they will soon initiate a \$2 million study of the Columbia river and its tributaries.

According to the Corps of Engineers, the study, estimated to cost \$1.96 million, has four basic objectives: environment, regional development, national growth and the quality of life in the Pacific Northwest.

The study has been delayed for several years pending completion of the Columbia-North Pacific framework plan, the construction of two large reservoirs in Canada and the establishment of a high voltage interconnection out of the Pacific Northwest, Ullman said.

"The Corps has given assurances they will actively seek public participation in the study," Ullman said.
