Herb Sez ...

There's a lot of chatter about conservation and I think it's about time for the true conservationist to get rid of his fellow riders that are anything but conservationists.

Let's take an example; that two men were each given a bag of oats. One of the men used part of his oats to make oat meal for his own food, he gave part of the oats to his horse which he used to plant the rest of his oats. As summer drew to an end he harvested more oats than he started with. At the close of 20 years he had oats to store, use and sell. That man is the conservationist.

The other man took his oats and jealously guarded them for 20 years. At the end of that time he had his bag of oats. They were inert, full of mouse tracks and his horse was dead. This man is the preservationist. A third man didn't really want any oats for himself. He wouldn't permit the conservationist to use his oats and wouldn't let the preservationist keep his oats. He didn't want to do anything but to stand still. This man is an obstructionist; he's against everything.

So it is with the wilderness areas, an area of more than 15 million acres. The conservationist wants to use them for multiple use and take care of them. The preservationist wants to keep them for his own private enjoyment. The obstructionist wants them to just stay there.

Many conservationists violently object to being called preservationists but the proof is in the pudding. The definition of wilderness is, that area where man is the visitor. He must leave the land as he found it, adding nothing and removing nothing. Now ask someone championing the wilderness concept if he agrees there should be no hunting or fishing. If he says, "There should be hunting but no logging, mining, grazing or anything else," he's a preservationist trying to maintain his own little private game preserve. A wilderness area should be just that, 'wilderness'.

A persons can go to walk and meditate but not to despoil in any manner what-so-ever. Regardless of what is said or done, Idaho will have millions of acres of wilderness for many years to come; we just happen to be built that way and no one can ever change much of this vast area.
