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SWIMMING POOL OPENS FOR SEASON, LESSONS TO BEGIN NEXT WEEK

Mel Calhoun, manager of the Nyssa Municipality Swimming Pool, announced today that swimming lesson sessions are still open for those interested in taking lessons in the mornings at the pool.

Lessons are \$1.50 per week, \$3.00 per session (2 weeks).

The following sessions are still open and parents or mothers may register their children at the pool between the hours of 1 and 3 p.m.

June 14 to 25, First Session, from 9 to 10 a.m. is still open for registrants. The 10 a.m. classes are closed.

Second Session, June 28 - July 9, from 9 to 10 a.m. and 10 to 11 a.m., and Third Session, July 12-23, 9 to 10 a.m. and 10 to 11 a.m.

Calhoun also stated that Lorinda Baker is Swim Team coach this year and anyone seven years of age to 17, interested in participating in swim team meets and practices are to sign up with her at the pool.

Lorinda is already giving swim team instructions at the present time and is expecting a large turnout this year.

Band Members Receive \$500

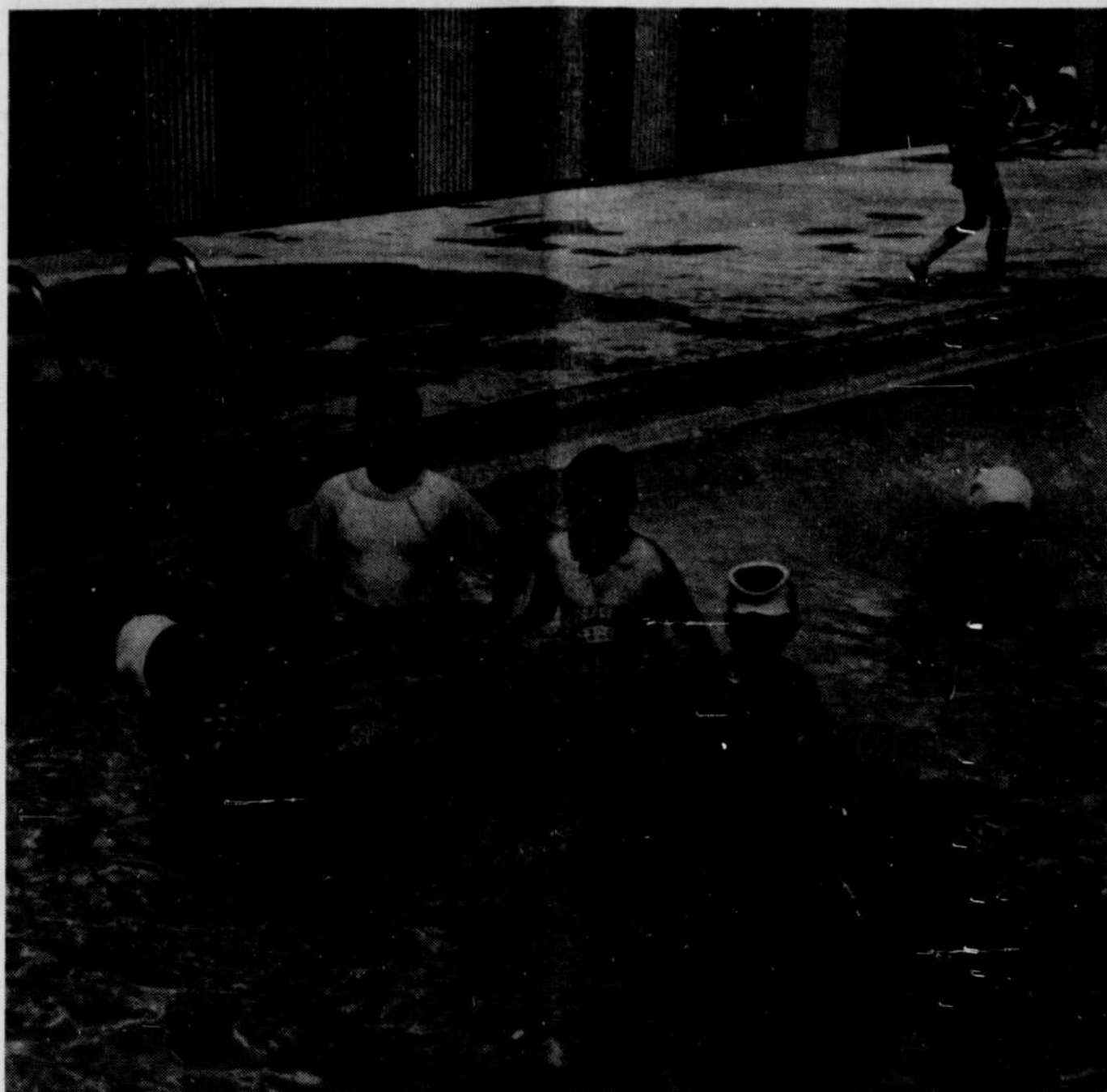

The group will include Iain More of Scotland, newly elected president of the Associated Students at the University of Oregon (ASUO); two student senators, Mrs. Torgesen, a freshman in liberal arts from Hampshire, England, and Stephanie Larson, sophomore in political science from Springfield; Lynda Mixon, Compton, California, sophomore in English, of the Black Student Union and ASUO Cultural Forum; and Carlos Batista, senior in architecture who teaches a student-initiated course on "homemade houses."

"We will be representing special student programs as well as the Associated Students of the University," says Mrs. Torgesen. She said the tour-members were selected to represent a variety of interests.

The students hope to meet with mayors, city council members, civic groups, and others interested.

The tour schedule includes Klamath Falls, June 14; Lakeview, June 15; Burns, June 16; Ontario, June 17; Baker, June 18; and John Day, June 19.

The team is taking with them a slide show about student activities on the Oregon campus, a film about the University of Oregon in general, and a film on the ASUO child day care center.

Mrs. Torgesen, who is on the staff of the ASUO Day Care Center in addition to being a student and a part-time registered nurse, says the students hope to make the Eastern Oregon tour an annual event.

She also points out that the ASUO plans to send students from the U of O to county fairs throughout the state, the Pendleton Roundup, and to other campuses where they would maintain information booths and answer questions.

The idea for the trip to Eastern Oregon originated when the Cultural Issues Center, re-

ceived letters from residents of Eastern Oregon asking about student-sponsored speakers.

Mrs. Torgesen's husband, Joel, who is going on the tour, suggested to her that personal contacts between students and citizens afforded by such a trip might further understandings.

CONCRETE FIRM DONATES LAND TO NYSSA FFA BOYS FOR FARMING PROJECT

The Nyssa FFA Chapter recently became actively engaged in farming when Oregon Concrete Products Company of Nyssa donated 16 1/2 acres of farm land to the chapter, rent free, to use for both an educational and fund raising project. The ground is located behind the concrete plant north of Nyssa.

Present plans call for raising silage corn on the land. (Various business and individuals in the community have shown that they are really behind the FFA program through their generous donations, according to Deryl Leggett, chapter advisor and Vo-Ag instructor. He said that Bauman Equipment Company, Palmers Equipment Company, Owyhee Truck and Implement Company and B & M Equipment Company

have all donated the use of machinery for the project this spring.

Leggett said that many FFA boys have brought in equipment from their homes, and Simplot Soilbuilders, Nyssa Co-op Supply and USS Steel have donated fertilizer. The corn is contracted to Roy Holmes for harvesting.

Glade Chadwick, manager of Oregon Concrete, has given the chapter enough concrete to pour approximately 930 feet of concrete ditch on the property. Roy Holmes, Bob Holmes and Bill Richesin donated the boat for pouring, and also gave a day of their time to help FFA members pour the ditch.

Leggett said it is hoped that the farm will be enough of a success this first year that it will be entirely self-sufficient next year, besides providing some money for the annual Parent & Son Banquet and other FFA activities and trips.

This undertaking has shown that the community is interested in the school and Vo-Ag program. It provides an excellent educational opportunity for putting into practice the skills taught in the classroom, Leggett said.

Firemen Save Watson Shed

Quick action on the part of Nyssa firemen saved the J.C. Watson Company shed late Tuesday evening. Fire was started in onion pallets stacked outside the shed, but was extinguished with only minor damage to eaves of the building.

Police Chief Alvin Allen said that it appeared an arsonist set the fire in the pallets, similar to a fire the night before in Ontario which destroyed the Iseri Produce warehouse and two adjoining houses. Allen said Arson Specialists from Salem have been called in to investigate both fires.

Latest report on Dr. Maulding was received Sunday when Mrs. Maulding called friends assuring them that Doctor is recuperating. He was to have been released from intensive care Sunday, but will remain in the hospital for at least 11 days.

Bank Debits Up

Bank Debits for the 8 reporting banks including Harney and Malheur counties were up in April, 1971, compared to April, 1970; the University of Oregon Bureau of Business and Economic Research has reported. Debits for April, 1971, totaled \$57,643,000. For March, 1971, the total was \$60,110,000 and for April, 1970, the total was \$55,434,000.

Oregon with 366 banks reporting had a percentage increase of 4.9 per cent in April, 1971, as compared with March, 1971, and a 4.5 per cent increase in April, 1971, as compared with April, 1970.

Total bank debits for April, 1971, came to \$5,632,585,000. For March, 1971, the total was \$5,371,869,000, and for April, 1970, the total was \$5,388,983,000.

Brent Richesin, Bob Holmes, Bill Holmes, David Robbins, Scott Goodell, Dwayne Ulrey and Frank Rodriguez will be judging livestock.

Frank Rodriguez will take one steer and one market hog to the show, and Jerry, David and Lurelle Robbins will exhibit their Charolais cattle.
